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FOR FARMERS

Land Use Adjustment.

Land use adjustment extended to 1,414,000 acres including purchase of 167,034 acres of isolated forest and dry-land homesteads for retirement from agricultural use, farm security within reach of 6,825 low-income farm families, and acquisition of 6,918 acres of good farm lands for rural resettlement; demonstrations well under way, summarize the major achievements of the resettlement administration in Oregon as the fiscal year closed June 30, announces Walter A. Duffy, regional director, Portland.

Stationary Spray Rig.

A stationary spray rig, which has been in operation for 10 years on the Hood River branch experiment station, has used for power through the period an engine from an old 1915 automobile which cost only \$25 originally and operates at a cost of about \$20 per year. According to an O.S.C. announcement so many advantages have been found in this spray outfit, as compared with the portable, that 15 or 20 growers in the valley are making such installations this year.

Horticultural Scientists Meet.

The group of scientists on which much of the progress of the horticultural industry in the Pacific northwest depends spent three days in conference at Oregon State college, pooling their information and getting ideas for future research. These scientists formed the Northwest Association of Horticulturists, Entomologists and Plant Pathologists 20 years ago. The next session will be held in Moscow, Ida., late in July of next year. Fifteen members of the American Pomological Society on a western tour joined in the final day's program.

Morning Glories Controlled.

Morning glories are being controlled by two methods on the Union branch experiment station without using chemicals. On one patch which had become badly infested, alfalfa was seeded, and by the end of the third year no morning glory can be found. Farmers throughout many parts of the state have successfully controlled morning glories with alfalfa on land where the latter will do well. In a variation of the clean cultivation method on the Union station a potato digger was used on a small patch to bring roots to the surface. At the end of two seasons, with one crop of fall wheat in between, the morning glories had been cleaned up.

Apiarists Move Hives to Westfir.

Forty hives of bees, owned by Harlow Hubbell, Ercel Anlauf and W. L. Workman, local apiarists, were moved Saturday night to the fireweed fields in the vicinity of Westfir. It is claimed that bees working in fireweed produce the finest grade and flavor of honey.

Fire Damages Caldwell House.

Fire that is believed to have caught from sparks did considerable damage Tuesday noon to the Charles E. Caldwell house at Third and Madison. A large hole was burned in the roof along side the chimney. The city fire department responded to the call and soon had the blaze extinguished.
