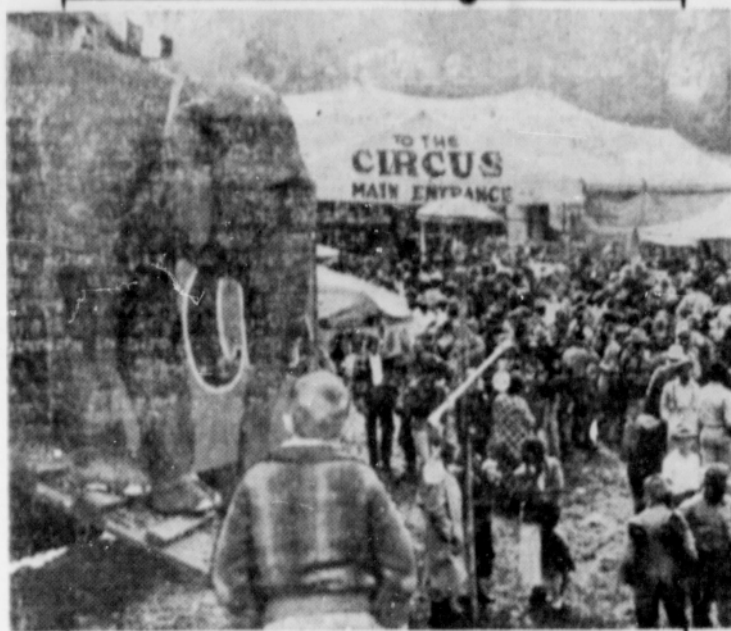


Circus, Once Roman, Built
