

An Imposing Array Of Concert Artists To Appear in Eugene

The most pretentious array of concert artists ever offered in the state outside of Portland has been announced by the Associated Students of the University of Oregon for its 1937-38 "Greater Artist" series.

Featured on the coming series will be Amelita Galli-Curci, beloved soprano; Helen Jepson, youthful Metropolitan Opera find; Lanny Ross, radio tenor; Angna Enters, current Broadway sensation; Nathan Milstein, violinist; the Hall-Johnson Negro choir, and the Shan-Kar Hindu ballet.

The Hall-Johnson choir, noted for its work in "Green Pastures," opens the series at McArthur court on October 18. Galli-Curci, one of the most popular concert artists of the generation appears on Sunday, October 24.

Angna Enters, aptly called the "one-woman theater," will make her first Oregon appearance on November 11. Nathan Milstein, first heard in Eugene in 1931, will be presented in concert February 13, followed by the colorful Shan-Kar ballet on February 22 and Lanny Ross, favorite of the "Showboat" radio show, on March 27. Beautiful Helen Jepson will close the series on Sunday, May 8, in a special Mothers' day and Junior week-end concert.

Season tickets, at \$5 and \$6 according to location, for the entire series, offering a saving of one-third, are now available to Cottage Grove citizens through Miss Forest Schneider. Holders of the season tickets will be entitled to reserved seats for each of the seven concerts.

So that local people may have an opportunity to personally select their seats for this series representative from the university with a seating chart of McArthur court, will be in Cottage Grove at the First National bank Friday, August 6, from 10 until 3 o'clock.

A down payment of \$1.25 may be made and the balance paid on or before October 1. When, upon payment, the ticket will be delivered.

Library Figures Indicate Status Business Trends

That library circulation figures are a good barometer of business conditions has been the contention of librarians throughout the nation and that their assumption is correctly taken is borne out by a check of June circulation figures of the local library for the past five years. During the depression years of 1932, 1933, and 1934 circulation was high but has slacked off with recovery in subsequent years. The peak was reached in 1933 when 1616 books were loaned in June. During June of this year only 1074 books were loaned.

During depression years when employment is scarce persons have more time for reading and less money for amusements so make use of public libraries, according to librarians.

The library has received two complimentary books — one, "The Blue Eagle from Egg to Earth" by General Hugh S. Johnson, was given by Doubleday, Doran & Company and the other, "America Strikes Back" was given by the Chemical Foundation. The first book is a compilation of General Johnson's memories of the NRA and is said to be a frank and unbiased discussion of the new deal. "America Strikes Back" is a refutation of incorrect foreign ideas of American business.

General housecleaning has been started by the library and within a few weeks the library will be recalculated. Recently the library board cleaned and moved every book on the shelves. A new bookcase has been added to the equipment.

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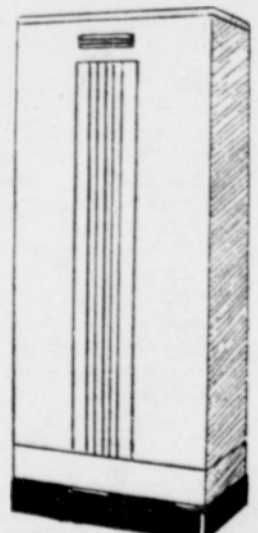
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
