

Izaak Waltons Hold Their Annual Meet At McMinnville

Important Resolutions Are Passed; Keitzer and Drenner Among the Officers Elected.

At the annual meeting of the Oregon Izaak Walton League held at McMinnville last Friday, Saturday and Sunday the following resolutions were passed: (1) Opposing the Willamette valley flood control project until the federal bureau of fisheries had made a survey into the probable damage to fish life from the proposed dams; (2) Favoring an increased trained personnel for wild life conservation; (3) Opposing the use of large baited spinners in coastal streams above tidewater in Tillamook and Lincoln counties; (4) Stocking of Mount Hood and Columbia gorge areas with mountain goats; (5) Favoring a closed season for coastal streams from November 30 until spring trout opening; (6) Opposing the offering of prizes or pools to the one getting the largest or first deer of the season because of the danger of small animals being shot and abandoned; (7) Favoring reservation of a strip of land adjoining lakes and streams for public use when adjoining property is sold by the state or counties and (8) favoring anti-pollution legislation.

Cottage Grove was honored by the election of two of its enthusiastic leaguers as officers for the coming year, Ed Keitzer and R. S. Drenner.

The newly elected officers are William P. Davidson, Portland, president, Ed Keitzer of Cottage Grove was reelected vice president and Harland Wood of Tillamook named secretary-treasurer. Davidson will succeed Corrigan.

Newly-elected directors are R. S. Drenner, Cottage Grove; Lynn B. Ferguson, Newberg, and Marvin W. Skipworth of Marshfield. Hold-over directors are Corrigan of McMinnville; John B. Ebinger and Ivan Clark of Portland; W. C. Foster of Tillamook; Dr. P. A. Loar of Silverton, Fred L. McGee of Bonneville and F. C. Robinson of Taft.
