

The Local Legion Auxiliary Active At Convention

The Cottage Grove American Legion auxiliary unit was cited by department officers for meritorious work during the year in reports given at the seventeenth department convention of the American Legion auxiliary, held August 12, 13 and 14 in Albany. The local unit was represented by Mrs. Jeanne Morton, president; Miss Eunice Vandenberg, secretary, and Mrs. George Matthews, past unit president and past district president.

Mrs. Morton served on the Fidac committee and Miss Vandenberg on the hospital committee during the convention and both named delegates were guests at the Past President's and Presidents' dinner Thursday evening, following the big American Legion parade.

District President Vada Whetstone favorably mentioned the local unit for their purchase during the year of the largest size of the Fidac colors and for their community service in providing leaders in Girl Scout and 4-H club work. In a report on Roseburg child welfare, the Cottage Grove unit received credit for Christmas cheer, clothing, local Christmas cheer and for a check-a-month contribution to child welfare work.

Honorable mention was given the unit by the Fidac department chairman. The local group was commended by the Roseburg veterans' hospital for its cooperation and for hospital work done during the past year. This consisted of a Christmas cheer check, cash, magazines, all for the Roseburg patients. For local assistance to veterans they were credited with contributing cash, giving a fruit basket to a veteran, flowers to sick members, toys to child in hospital, quota of dime-for-disabled, and sale of 1000 poppies. Reports of the membership chairman showed that the Cottage Grove unit reached its membership in March, one month too late to receive a citation. The poppy chairman's report showed that the unit remitted proceeds in excess of last year. At Saturday's session the district president cited the local unit for work accomplished during the year.
