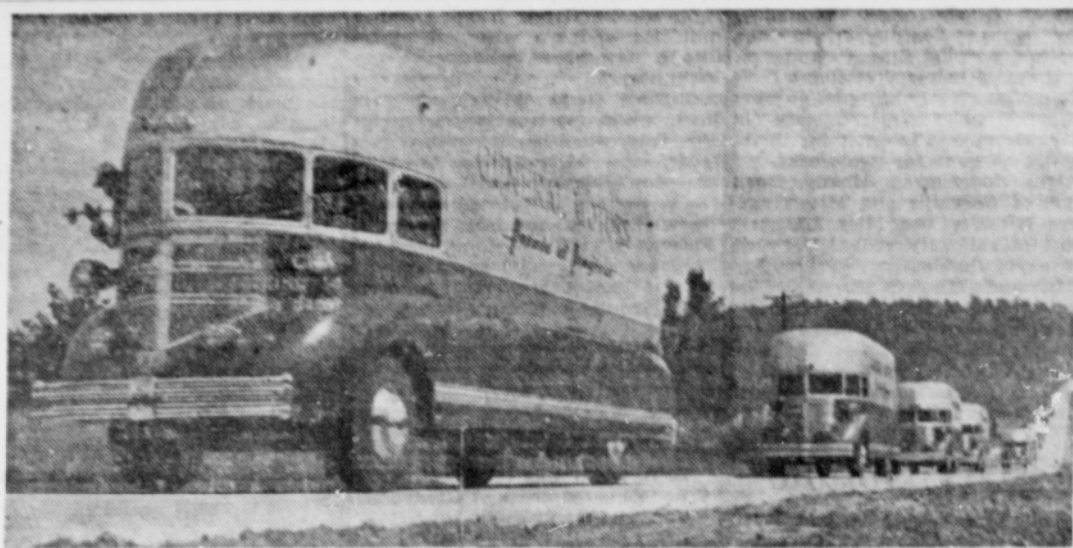

New Thrills, New Kind of Circus Coming to Eugene

A new kind of circus is coming to Eugene, with a new kind of thrills. There will be no trapeze acts, painted clowns or trained seals; in fact, the only thing reminiscent of the old kind of circus will be the "big top" which will be erected to house part of the unique science show.

Electricity, chemistry and other tools of science will be put through their paces by men of research. Queer antics of light, sound and electric power will be demonstrated.

The Parade of Progress Exposition, which will be in Eugene for a two-day stand beginning August 25, is offered to the public free of charge. The show is sponsored by the General Motors Corporation, and is under the auspices of the Eugene chamber of commerce.

Progress is depicted in many fields. Several sets, through which the public may pass, portray the progress in home furnishings and kitchen equipment. The contrast of a parlor of 1890 with a modern living room is not half so well realized until they are seen side by side.

Twenty-four huge streamlined trucks will bring the exposition into the city. As the trucks are driven onto location, they are converted as if by magic into spacious exhibit halls, completely enclosed against the weather. Sixty men make up the personnel of the "world's fair on wheels," under the direction of J. M. Jerpe. Most of the men are college trained, and have had special schooling to enable them to do the variety of work necessary on the Parade of Progress.

The exposition will be held at the Lane county Fair Grounds.
