County Will Build Van Schoiack Road

County Commissioner Holland Makes Announcement After Road Inspection Trip

The Van Schoiack road which joins the Row river road at Kelly bridge will be completed this fall by Lane county, W. J. Holland, county commissioner, said Tuesday on his return from a road inspection tour in this section of the county. The proviso laid down by the county is that there will be no cost for rights of way or moving fences. This road serves five or six families situated southeasterly of Row river in the vicinity of Dorena. The road already has been declared a county road.

Commissioner Holland and County Surveyor P. M. Morse also inspected the county road between London and the Black Butte mines which is being resurfaced with slag from the mines.

Grading is practically completed on the Bennett creek road and a county compressor was used this week to break up a rocky point in the road. This accounted for the blasting that shook the city the fore part of the week.

James Tedford, county road supervisor for this section of Lane, conferred with members of the county court Wednesday in Eugene in regard to road matters here.
