Safeway Founded 22 Years Ago at American Falls

In celebration of the twenty-second anniversary of the founding of the Safeway store system, the local store is holding a large anniversary sale and harvest jubilee.

The first Safeway store, then known as Skaggs, was started in 1915 in American Falls, Ida., by S. M. Skaggs, a minister of the gospel, and during the past 22 years has grown into a large system covering 21 western states. The system expanded through Idaho. Later stores were started in Portland and the system spread throughout Oregon. Then the Skaggs stores became the Skaggs United Stores. Later the name, Skaggs Safeway stores, was adopted and this finally was simplified to Safeway stores.

The local store has expanded with the growth of the parent organization, moving about three years ago into its present large quarters at Sixth and Main streets.

Former Resident Dies in Eugene.

Mrs. Frances B. Clark Watkins, who was a resident of this city for 20 years prior to 1919, died Sunday in Eugene at the age of 81. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in Eugene, Rev. Henry W. Davis of the local Baptist church officiating. Interment was in the Masonic Odd Fellow cemetery in this city.

Mrs. Watkins was a native Oregonian. She was born in Benton county November 9, 1855. Her parents were pioneers. She was a member of the Presbyterian church in Benton county. She moved from Cottage Grove to Eugene in 1919, residing in that place since that time.

She is survived by two sons, Ernest of Albany and Harry of Eugene, and five daughters, Mrs. L. E. Camp, Portland; Mrs. W. A. McCormick, Bakerfield, Cal.; Mrs. W. A. Nelson, Oakland, Cal.; and Mrs. Daisy Cartwright and Mrs. Lewena Wright of Eugene.

Young Murphy was helping load logs on a truck when the top log shifted and carried off a second log, one of the two striking the lad. The accident happened but a few minutes before quitting time.

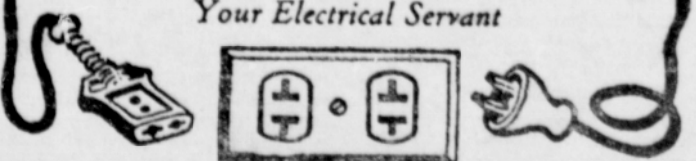
