Mrs. J. S. Lake Dies After Long Illness

Mrs. J. S. Lake, 81, who had been ill for some time, died at 9:30 Wednesday evening at the home of her son, Henry Lake, on Mosby creek. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Columbia A. McKee was born January 13, 1856, near Shelby Springs, Alabama. When quite young she moved with her parents Milton and Mary McKee to near Talladega, Talladega county, Ala. When she was 13 years old, the family of the parents and their children, John C., Zack J., Charles Lindsay, Lamantha, Della and Columbia, moved to Cherokee, Ala., where they stayed a year and another son, George Lindsay, was born there. The family left by river steamer May 15, 1869, for St. Croix Falls, Wis., where they settled.

Columbia McKee was married to Joseph S. Lake on December 7, 1873. Both joined the Christian church soon after their marriage. To this union eleven children were born, two sons and nine daughters. Late in September, 1894, the family emigrated to Oregon, settling near Oakland, where another daughter Minnie was born. The family lived there for several years. Mr. Lake died there May 6, 1909. In 1910 with four daughters and one son Mrs. Lake moved to Cottage Grove, where she resided until the time of her death.

Mrs. Lake was the mother of twelve children, two sons and ten daughters: Mrs. Sophronia Cox, Eugene; Andrew C. Lake, Noti; Mrs. Frances Briggs, Grants Pass; Mrs. Sophia Miller, Cottage Grove; Mrs. Olive Porteous, Castella, Cal.; Mary Lake, deceased; Mrs. Dora Havens, Sacramento, Cal.; Mrs. Anna Myers, Cottage Grove; Henry M. Lake, Cottage Grove; Mrs. Matilda Mary Cole, Eugene; Mrs. Myrtle L. Myers, deceased; Mrs. Minnie Myers, Cottage Grove.

She is survived by two brothers, Charles Lindsay McKee of Webster, Wis., and George Lindsay McKee of Portland; eight daughters, two sons, twenty-nine grand children and twenty-nine great grandchildren.

Mrs. L. W. Coiner reported that about \$25 worth of milk is distributed to school children each month. Those children who are able to do so pay for this service but the biggest percentage is given free to undernourished children. This donation is made possible by the Fraternal Order of Eagles and the Eagles auxiliary. The men's lodge donates \$15 a month and the auxiliary \$5. School authorities say that this service has been greatly beneficial to a large number of children.

Mrs. Charles Beldier told of the work done by the loan closet committee. The group keeps on hand a supply of linen, sheets and sick room supplies, loaning these in emergent cases.

Mrs. C. J. Kem reported on the Christmas seal sale which will start the day after Thanksgiving. Funds raised from this sale are used in the fight against tuberculosis.

Mrs. Anne Leffingwell, resident nurse of the Lane county health unit, described her work. Since her arrival here she has visited 17 schools in the community and has examined 239 school children. She spends each Monday visiting the local schools. She will have an office in the armory and will maintain regular office hours.
