



Artists of Music World Scheduled By University

University of Oregon, Eugene, October 13.—(Special).—Two great artists will bring music of widely differing types to the University of Oregon campus this month when the concert series of the associated students commences. Hall Johnson will bring his celebrated Negro choir to the campus for an evening performance on October 18, while Mme. Amelita Galli-Curci, world-famed coloratura soprano, will be heard in a matinee recital on Sunday, October 24.

Capacity audiences are expected for both events, with reservations being received at the university's educational activities office from many communities near Eugene.

The primitive, emotion-packed songs of the southern Negro will be heard at their best during the Hall Johnson choir concert. Members of the choir are all descendants of southern Negro slaves and have heard the traditional spirituals from earliest childhood.

The nation's leading musicians and music critics have attested to the artistry of the choir. Further acclaim came to it when it was heard in the Broadway and the screen versions of "Green Pastures."

Greatly in contrast to the traditional plantation airs will be the operatic arias to be offered by Mme. Galli-Curci, known the world over for her concert and operatic triumphs. Audiences in every continent of the globe have paid enthusiastic tribute to her technique, which lends itself equally well to such familiar numbers as "Home, Sweet Home" and "Coming Through the Rye," and to the brilliant works of operatic literature.

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Bohemia Lumber Co. To Close Down Mill

Woods Crew to Lay Off Friday
—Lack of Orders, Failure
Of Market Causes Shutdown.

The woods crew of the Bohemia Lumber Sales company, which operates at Culp Creek, will be laid off Friday and the mill will close down as soon as all logs in the pond are cut, it was announced this week. It is expected to complete cutting Monday and the shut down will be for an indefinite period.

The closing becomes mandatory because of lack of orders. This is attributed in part to the fact that the California market, which is the big winter market for this mill, is dead and partly to the building slump that has become nationwide.

The Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association had recommended curtailment of production to offset lack of orders at a recent meeting in Eugene.

The Sentinel has been unable to learn what the plans of other mills in the district are but it is rumored that curtailment will be the order of the day.
