

## C. G. Lions Downed 20 to 6 by Roseburg

Breaks of Game Go Against  
Locals; Rutter Scores For  
Visitors With 92 Yard Run

Playing a strong defensive game but with the breaks going against them, the Cottage Grove high school football team dropped a tough game 20 to 6 to the Roseburg Indians Friday afternoon on muddy Kelly field. The visitors tallied early in the second quarter on a blocked punt and twice in the fourth quarter, once on a pass interception and once on a 92 yard gallop by Pete Rutter, diminutive halfback. The Lions chalked up their score in the fourth quarter.

Roseburg made two determined thrusts at the Cottage Grove goal in the first quarter. One was turned back when a Roseburg man caught a pass out of bounds in the end zone, giving Cottage Grove the ball on her own 20-yard stripe. At the start of the second quarter the Lions were backed against their own goal line and Patten, back of the goal line, attempted to punt out of danger but Helmbolt, Roseburg center, broke through, blocked the kick and Campbell, Roseburg end, fell on the ball for the score. Fritts' place kick for the extra point went wide.

Both teams played hard defensive football for the remainder of the second quarter and in the third. The Cottage Grove line was breaking through fast to stop Rutter, Roseburg's small halfback who was the offensive dynamite of the Indians.

At the start of the final quarter the Lions tried a pass deep in their own territory, flipping the pigskin into the flat. Campbell for the Indians broke through to deflect the ball into the hands of Sanders who ran the remaining 20 yards to score standing up. Fritts' kick was good.

The Lions started goal-ward when Bartels ran back Fritts' kickoff from his own 20 to the Roseburg 45. A pass, Patten to Thorsen, put the ball on the Roseburg 12. On the next play Roseburg was offside and the penalty put the Lions on the Roseburg 7. Patten on two tries bucked the ball across for the touchdown. Bartels' kick was not good.

Recovering a Roseburg fumble on their own 40, the Lions again started a drive toward pay dirt, smashing to the Roseburg 8, where they lost the ball on downs. Roseburg, with only seconds to play in the final quarter, broke Rutter loose on a faked pass, and he raced 92 yards to a touchdown. Fritts' collected the extra point on a place kick. Final score: Roseburg 20, Cottage Grove 6.

The Lions showed a smooth running attack but their passing was weak. The locals piled up six first downs to four for Roseburg. The Lions carried the ball 15 times, gaining 68 yards and the Indians packed the pigskin 29 times for 91 yards. Cottage Grove attempted nine passes, had three intercepted and completed two for 48 yards. Roseburg attempted nine passes, gaining only 10 yards via the aerial route. The visitors garnered 71 yards on the three Lion passes they intercepted. Cottage Grove averaged 15½ yards on its punts and Roseburg averaged 24 yards. The locals outdistanced the visitors on punt returns.

Guggisberg, Linebaugh, Edwards and Grannis stood out defensively for the Lions while Hatfield, Campbell and Helmbolt were mainstays in the Indian line. Bartels and Patten in the backfield showed nice line plunging for the Lions and MacGibbon stopped several Roseburg drives with some nice tackling.

MacGibbon and Linebaugh won the two milk shakes offered by Coach French to the backfield man and the lineman who did the best blocking in the Roseburg game.

Guggisberg received a bad cut over his nose in a pileup and Merrell and Thorsen suffered twisted ankles. The team as a whole came through the game with little injury. The Lions have an open date Friday.
