Friday and Saturday, or until the blooms are taken by frost, dahlia lovers will have an opportunity to see a display of some of the choicest dahlias that can be grown in this territory. The display will be presented at the Blossom Shop and is being arranged by L. C. Boldenweck of the Oregon Florists' seed company.

"Consistent with our policy of interesting people in raising bulbs for pleasure and profit, we have made an effort to show people some of the beautiful blooms of the choicest dahlias that can be grown in this vicinity," Mr. Boldenweck stated. "In fact every kind of bulb that we have offered can be grown here.
