

State to Hold Tests For Commission Posts

Selection of personnel for present or future vacancies and necessary expansion of the Unemployment Compensation commission will be made from eligible lists established from open competitive merit examinations, it was announced this week.

Positions open at present or that will be in the near future include referee, assistant accountant, junior accountant, field auditor, junior claim deputy, junior claim deputy, senior accounting clerk, intermediate accounting clerk and junior accounting clerk.

Necessary qualifications for all posts mentioned include education and experience. The positions will range in pay from \$1020 to \$3120 per year.

Applications must be filed at 305 Old Postoffice building, Portland, by November 12.

equipment which he will show is the kind of inhalator which the fire department hopes to purchase for use of the city, provided the first annual firemen's ball Saturday night is a financial success.

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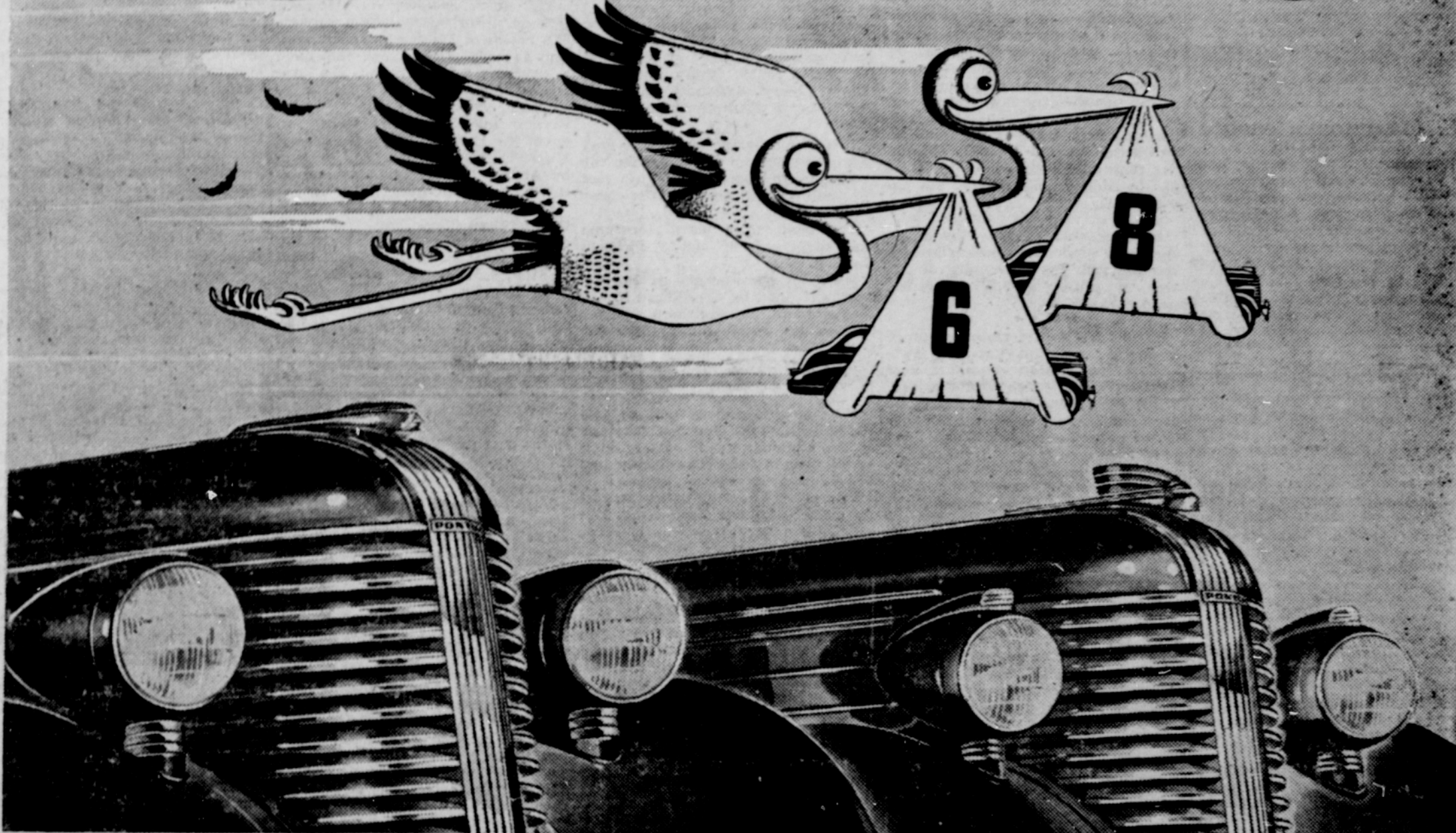
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
