Self-Defense is Plea of Radich at Trial

The trial of Frank Radich, charged with second degree murder for the slaying of Harry Hanson October 8 at Woodson's auto camp here, got under way speedily Wednesday in circuit court with the defense attorney massing evidence to substantiate the self-defense plea of the prisoner and the district attorney attempting to show that jealousy over Mrs. Mabel Boeson motivated the slaying.

Not a juror was challenged and the first 12 called to the box were sworn in as official jurors less than 20 minutes after court opened. Jury members are Clark P. Devereaux, George W. Hofess, Waldo W. Taylor, James E. Hicks, John Halvorsen, Bertha Hansen, Mabel C. Perdue, W. O. Swann, Harry A. Osburn, Louis C. Leonard, Effie Knowles and Frank Montgomery.

Defense Attorney Howard Brownell, in his opening statement, contended that on the night of the shooting that Hanson was intoxicated and that he had threatened numerous times to "break Radich in two in the middle." This was corroborated later in the testimony of two witnesses.

District Attorney L. L. Ray, in presenting his case to the court, indicated that the state would attempt to prove that Radich shot Hanson as the result of differences over the affections of Mrs. Boeson.

Dr. A. W. Kime, Night Officer John Schaffer, R. N. Toland, Mrs. Boeson and her daughter, Marjorie Halle, and J. C. Beck were among the Cottage Grove witnesses called the first day of the trial.
