Loon Lake to Be Stocked In Spring

Loon lake will be stocked with spiny-rayed fish early in 1938, officers of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club were notified this week in a letter from Matt Ryckman, superintendent of fisheries.

The club has been working toward this end for nearly a year, since Loon lake is a favorite fishing spot for many members of the club.

In a letter addressed to the club secretary Mr. Ryckman stated in part: "I am sorry to inform you that it will be impossible for us to plant any Spiny-Rayed fish in Loon Lake this fall. This work will have to be done next spring when we start our salvaging operations. We will certainly place your letter on file and, as soon as our salvaging work begins, we will take care of this lake."

The local club has enjoyed good cooperation from the state game commission during the past year, receiving more than 200,000 trout fingerlings, and 250 pheasants for planting in this community.

M. W. Crawford Dies

Manley Winfield Crawford, a resident of Cottage Grove for the past eight years, died at his home at Tenth and Lincoln about 7 o'clock Tuesday night. He was aged 76 years, 2 months, 15 days.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock this (Thursday) afternoon at the Mills chapel, Rev. Henry W. Davis officiating. Interment will be in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Crawford was born August 31, 1861, in Ada, O. He was married July 5, 1885, in Shelby, Mich., to Minerva A. Potter. To this union was born one son, Lloyd S. Crawford. Mrs. Crawford died in 1888. Mr. Crawford was married February 15, 1933, in Cottage Grove to Fostina L. Blackmar.

Mr. Crawford had been a resident of Oregon for about 49 years. He came to Cottage Grove eight years ago from Woodburn. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving relatives include the widow, Fostina L. Crawford; one son, Lloyd S. Crawford, Cottage Grove; four step-children, Mrs. Lulu Fuller, Drammond, Mont.; Mrs. Eunice Ferich, Poplar Mont.; C. B. Blackmar and Harold Black-

mar, both of Portland; three grandchildren; two great grandchildren, and one sister, Mrs. Maude Montgomery, Eureka, Cal.

Christmas Mail Must Be Sent Soon

Christmas mail for foreign delivery should be mailed in the near future, according to information in a recent issue of The Postal Bulletin.

Mail intended for points in the Azores, Cape Verde Islands, Ceylon, Cyprus, and certain other points must be mailed this month, to be sure of delivery. Most other foreign mail should be mailed before December 10, although some nearby islands, including Bermuda, may be reached if parcels are in New York by December 18.

It is not possible to guarantee the delivery of parcel post, due to customs formalities that must, in most cases, be complied with before actual delivery is made to addressee.

Mail for Pacific coast ports should be dispatched this month, in most cases, the bulletin states.

Full information regarding mailing dates for all foreign points may be secured at the local post office, according to Postmaster N. J. Nelson Jr.
