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Proposed Bill To Govern Commercial Fishing Received

Ed W. Miller, general manager of the Oregon Coast Highway association, who, with commercial fishermen from Marshfield and other points along the coast, had planned to meet with members of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club at their next regular meeting January 10, writes that he will be unable to be present, owing to the fact that the state planning board, of which he is a member, has a meeting scheduled for the same time. R. S. Drenner, club president, announced Wednesday that the regular meeting of the club would be held Monday and a special meeting arranged for a date convenient to Mr. Miller and the commercial fishermen.

A draft of a proposed enactment covering the size and methods of use of nets by commercial fishermen was submitted by letter by Mr. Miller and will be discussed informally by club members at their meeting Monday.

The proposed bill prohibits the use of set nets, attached to either shore or stake in all waters in the state; prohibits commercial fishing on all streams except the Columbia and Umpqua rivers, and on the Umpqua above the mouth of Mill creek and within 1000 feet of any tributary stream or slough.

The bill vests the fish commission with authority to open and close the commercial season with certain restrictions, and prohibits net fishing on Saturday night and Sunday and on the night before and on any legal holiday.

POWER BILL TO BE INITIATED

Immediately following J. D. Ross' declaration that he favored financing utility districts through revenue certificates, the People's Power League took the first step to initiate such a measure. Dr. J. F. Hosch, league president, an-

nounced that the question would be placed before the voters of Oregon at the election next November.

A committee of the People's Power League appointed by Dr. Hosch met this week to draft a short initiative measure that would enable publicly-owned plants to be constructed or purchased for distribution of Bonneville power. Speaking at Hillsboro, J. D. Ross, Bonneville chief, said that "power should stand on its own feet. It is eminently able to do so."

Dr. J. F. Hosch, following Ross' suggestion, announced that the bill the People's Power League would initiate "would not place any burden on general property, and that no funds would be raised from taxes."

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The council authorized the city engineer to take up with the county court the question of acquiring enough property for the straightening of the approach to the west end of the main street bridge across the Coast Fork of the Willamette river.

An ordinance was passed granting the petition of the trustees of the Assembly of God and of J. M. Vasbinder and Kate Vasbinder, asking for the vacation of a 12 feet in width alley extending north and south entirely through block one, and also entirely through block four of Georgetown addition to Cottage Grove. The Assembly of God being the owner and in possession of all the property ly-

ing on both sides of said alley through block one and the Vasbinders being the owners and in possession of all the property lying on both sides of said alley through lots 2, 4 and 5.
