

The Lumbermen's Association Will Meet at Tacoma 28th

West Coast Sales Managers Will Also Meet at Tacoma the Day Before the Association

The regular annual meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's association is scheduled for January 28 at Tacoma, Washington. A special meeting for West Coast sales managers will also be held at Tacoma on January 27.

The principal program subjects for the January 28 meeting, according to the Association announcement, will be questions of lumber grading and inspection, developments in lumber research and engineering, West Coast lumber transportation problems, lumber trade promotion, governmental relations, and labor relations.

H. J. Cox, manager of the Eugene office of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, speaking for the industry in the Willamette Valley region, released the following Association statement:

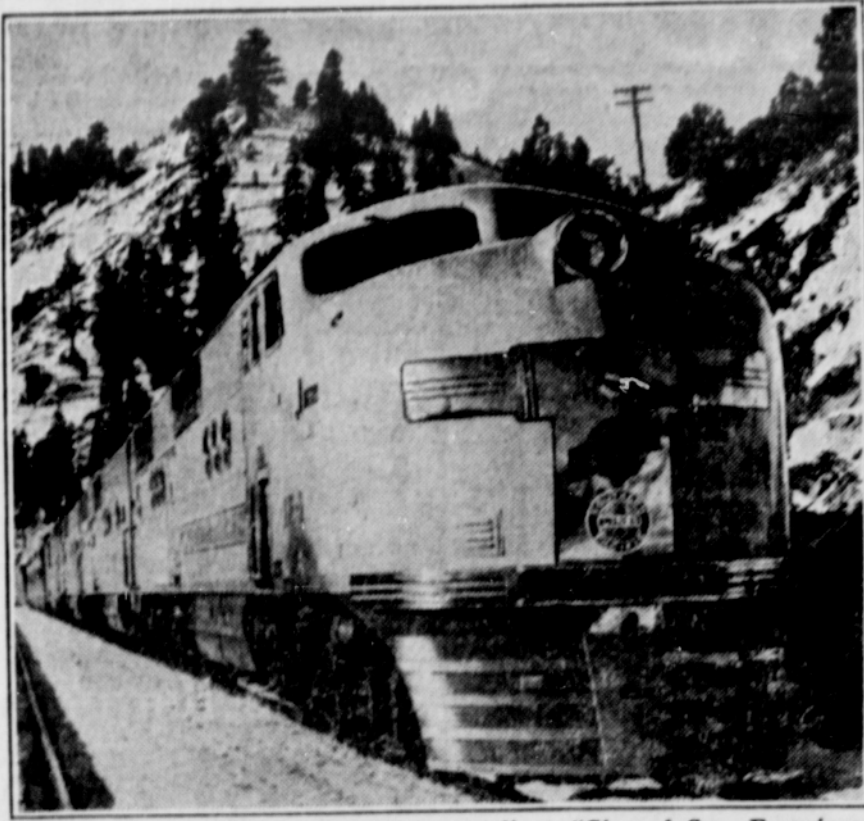
"Lumber promotion and research and governmental relations will form three broad divisions of discussion at the 1938 Annual Meeting. In each the West Coast made a march forward in 1937, despite declines in orders and production. One striking example in the promotional field is the success of the 1937 Demonstration Small Homes Campaign of the nation's retail lumber dealers and lumber manufacturers, in which the West Coast industry took a major part. 3000 demonstration homes were built, at costs which provide a complete factual refutation of the charges that home building costs have risen excessively.

In lumber research, new uses for metal ring connectors in timber construction were developed in 1937, lamination was increased as a principle of lumber use, and such processes as the salt seasoning of timbers were perfected to a point of practical application. In governmental relations, the West Coast lumber industry advanced to a promise of equal treatment with other industries in the negotiation of trade agreements with foreign countries. Progress in these divisions benefited all the Pacific Northwest."

The Association announcement called attention to the part taken by the industry in scientific research in forest products, as an example of the willingness of West Coast lumbermen to invest in the future. At the Forest Products Laboratory, Madison, Wisconsin, the experiments of W. K. Loughborough, with the support of the industry, have produced practical methods of using salt and glucose solutions on timbers, the Association said, with the effect of protecting them against weather checks and shrinkage. This application promises to become as important to lumber as the use of weather-proofing paints to other materials, according to the announcement. It will be discussed at the meeting by L. A. Nelson, director of the Association's Department of Grades and Inspection, with Committee Chairman Carl G. Kinney presiding.

"With more than three-fourths of the rail traffic originating in Washington and Oregon, and a similar percentage of offshore shipping from the same region depending upon lumber," the announcement continued, "there should be general interest in the presentation of this subject by G. T. Gerlinger, chairman of the association's traffic committee, and K. C. Batchelder, manager of the Traffic Department. The industry's various efforts in lumber trade promotion will be described by specialists from both the National and West Coast's trade promotion committee, presiding. Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary-manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association, Washington, D. C., will speak on governmental relations, with E. W. Demarest, chairman of the Committee on

LARGEST, MOST POWERFUL



The new 17-car 5400-horsepower streamliner "City of San Francisco," largest and most powerful in the world, which has just been placed in service by Southern Pacific, is shown passing over the snow covered Sierra. With a passenger capacity of 222, as compared to 170 on the old streamliner of the same name which it replaces, the new train is powered by a three-car Diesel-electric locomotive. It is owned and operated jointly by Southern Pacific, Union Pacific and Chicago & North Western railroads, and makes the San Francisco-Chicago run in 35 1/4 hours.

Governmental Relations, directing the discussion. Current lumber industry labor relations will be presented to the meeting by John D. Tennant, chairman, Advisory Committee on Industrial Relations. The meeting will open with an address by the president of the Association, T. V. Larsen, of the firm of Forcia & Larsen, Noti, Oregon, and this will be followed by the report of the secretary-manager, Col. W. B. Greeley, and the election of District Trustees for 1938.

"At the January 27 meeting of sales managers," the announcement concluded, "fourteen specific problems of promoting and merchandising the products of the 187 member mills of the Association will also be discussed. Dr. Compton will also speak at this meeting, on 'National Trends in Government Control of Trade Practices,' while H. R. Northrup will talk on 'Campaigning for Lumber-Built Homes in 1938,' and H. G. Uhl will present the question, 'Where Do We Stand in Timber Engineering?'. The two latter speakers are also from the National Lumber Manufacturers Association."

Protect Mothers and Babies Poster Panel

For the first time, from coast to coast, outdoor poster panels are being used to display a message designed to protect mothers and babies from syphilis. The poster, directing public attention to the need for every expectant mother to go early to a physician for an examination and blood tests, was produced by the New York State Committee on Tuberculosis and Public Health. Its display, starting this month, was made possible locally by the Oregon Social Hygiene Society, through the cooperation of several billboard advertising companies. Approved by Dr. Thomas Parran, Jr., surgeon general of the United States Public Health Service; Dr. Edward S. Godfrey Jr., New York Health Commissioner and Dr. William F. Snow, managing director of the American Social Hygiene association, the latter association has adopted the design to promote the observance, throughout America, of the second National Social Hygiene Day, February 2, 1938.

Every organization in every town and city is urged to discuss or have a talk on social hygiene and especially on the eradication of syphilis during the week beginning January 31 or soon thereafter. Materials for talks may be obtained from the Oregon Social Hygiene Society, 376 Pittcock Block, Portland.

Tremendous Trifles

A LITTLE MORE GRAPE

ON FEBRUARY 23, 1847, Gen. Santa Anna's Mexicans broke through the lines of Gen. Zachary Taylor's American army at Buena Vista and were about to cut off one flank. Then a little battery and a few Kentucky volunteers, commanded by Capt. William Tecumseh Sherman and Braxton Bragg, swung into action. For a few precious moments they held back the Mexicans. General Taylor, coming on to the field, saw what they were doing. Yanking off his old straw hat, he swung it over his head and shouted: "Give 'em h—l, Captain Bragg!" A few hours later Santa Anna's hosts were in retreat. Soon the United States was ringing with the praises of Gen. Zachary Taylor, "The Hero of Buena Vista." The next year the Whigs selected him as their candidate for President. They needed a good slogan for the campaign and his remark to Captain Bragg provided it.

"Elegance" of language was considered very important in that squeamish era. True, Taylor was known as "Old Rough and Ready" to his soldiers, but the Whigs were a bit dubious about the use of "h—l" in their slogan. So the partisan newspapers edited his remark on that historic occasion. They substituted "a little more grape" for that questionable word, meaning that Captain Bragg should blast the Mexican enemy with grape-shot. It was a good slogan. It sent Zachary Taylor to the White House.

Trap Shoot at Eugene.

The Eugene gun club is sponsoring a "jack pot" shoot at the aviation field in Eugene Sunday. Last Sunday members of the Cottage Grove club were guests at the R. S. Drenner ranch near Culp Creek, where they shot numerous holes in the air in a more or less vain effort to run a good score on Drenner's skeet range. The men found the sport fascinating and plan to return to try their luck at a later date.

Speaker to Describe Conditions in Russia, Siberia and Balkans

Paul Stephen Rahneff from Sofia, Bulgaria will speak at the Pentecostal Assembly of God Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 7:30 this coming week (Jan. 25, 26 and 27).

Mr. Rahneff was born in Bulgaria, of Greek Orthodox Catholic faith. He received his education in Bulgaria, England, and Columbia University, New York City. He speaks German, Russian, English and Bulgarian. After his conversion to Christ, he returned to his native land and now corresponds for several large European newspapers, and is a leader in the move to unite the small Balkan states under a good will pact. Mr. Rahneff is a member of the Bulgarian delegation that brought greetings from that nation to the then King Edward VIII, now Duke of Windsor, and presented him with a bottle of rare perfume from the famous Valley of Roses. He will describe conditions in Russia, Siberia and the Balkan states.

Unreleased Mortgage Chattels Unsafe Buy

Persons selling, trading or receiving chattels mortgaged to the Farm Security Administration as security for rehabilitation loans are liable to court action by the government if legal releases have not been secured, according to a notice received from the regional attorney, reports Harry Bower, county rehabilitation supervisor, Eugene, Ore.

Restrictions are placed on sale or transfer of chattels mortgaged to Farm Security Administration not only to provide partial security for rehabilitation loans but to insure maintenance of sufficient operating goods to keep the farm on a productive basis and carry out farm plans, says the notice.

Where sale or trade of mortgaged chattels is necessary because of changes in farm operation, authorization for transfer of such property should be secured through the county supervisor's office, Bower pointed out.

Q. What rights do I have if leading animals on the highway? You may signal motorists coming from the opposite direction to stop, and they must do so, giving you a reasonable time to drive or lead your animals past. Motorists must use caution in passing ani-

mals going in the same direction, and in any case must stop their motors if necessary to prevent frightening the animals and causing accident or injury.

Q. Is it legal for me to hitch-hike?

A. No. In Oregon it is unlawful for you to stand in a roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the driver of any private vehicle. Hitchhikers usually violate the further provision that pedestrians should walk on the left side of the roadway.
