Stroud, Name of Blanket

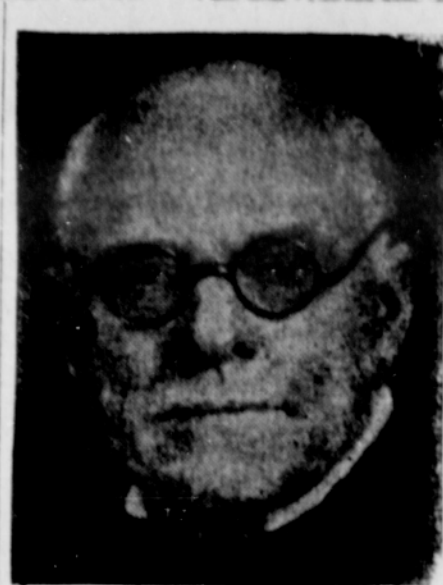
Stroud was the name of a coarse blanket or garment used in Colonial days in trading with the Indians.
