English clover would grow in Australia, but produced no seed until bees from Great Britain were taken there for cross-fertilization purposes.

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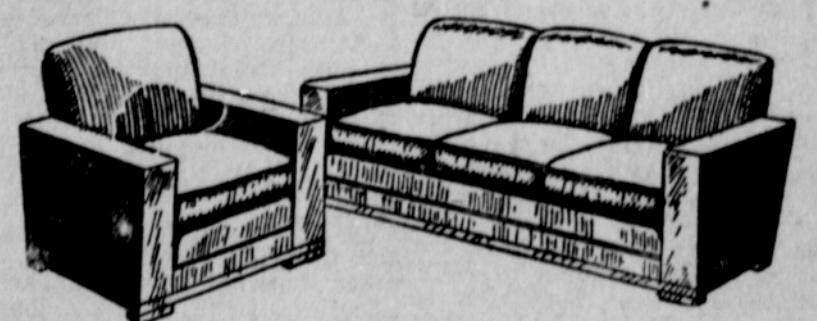
