

University Presents Uday Shan-Kar and His Hindu Ballet



University of Oregon, Eugene, February 16. (Special.) — Rice bowls containing water are among the unusual sources of music used by Uday Shan-Kar and his Hindu ballet, which will perform in McArthur Court, Eugene, Monday, February 21.

Water in the bowls is kept at varying levels to provide a variety of pitches. A pail of water is kept handy in the wings to change the pitch of each bowl for the various musical numbers.

Other ancient musical instruments, used by the Hindu orchestra which accompanies the ballet, fall into the classifications of percussion, string and wind instruments.

Musical director and chief com-

poser for Shan-Kar is Vishnudas Shirali, leading musical authority in present-day India.

But the orchestra, with its sitars, sarangis, sarodes and other instruments, contributes only a part of the color of the performance of the ballet. Even more vivid are the dazzling costumes, the dancers themselves, and the exotic gesturings of the dances.

BEN B. GROFF

Ben B. Groff, a former resident of Cottage Grove, who has been residing at Prineville, Oregon, for more than 20 years, died there, at the age of 53, at about 6 o'clock P. M. Tuesday, February 8, apparently the victim of a heart attack. The body was discovered by his daughter, Mrs. Warren Raymond, who started a search when he failed to appear for dinner. The body was in the barn, where he had apparently been feeding a milk cow. At the time of his death Mr. Groff was sheriff of Crook county and had been appointed and twice elected to that office. He had also served as commissioner of that county.

Mr. Groff and his chief deputy, Ralph Jordan, had worked in his office all day, compiling tax records. Jordan stated that Groff appeared to be in the best of health when he left the office at about 5:15.

For a number of years after going to Crook county he operated a stock ranch near Post. In recent years he had been building up his stock and had planned to retire to his ranch in 1941, at the expiration of his term as sheriff.

Aside from his wife, Margaret, Mr. Groff is survived by three children, Mrs. Maybelle Raymond, Elizabeth and Barr Groff, all residents of Prineville.

Curtis Veatch and I. H. Veatch of Cottage Grove are uncles of Mrs. Groff. The former went to Prineville and will stay there for two weeks.

No news has been received as to the funeral arrangements.

THOMAS WILLIAM PLANK

Thomas William Plank, for 23 years a resident of the Cottage Grove section, died at Rogue River, Oregon, on Monday at the age of 80 years and 10 months. He died at the home of a son, James Plank.

Surviving are six children, 21 grand children and six great grand children. Also one brother, and three sisters, all of California, survive.

The children are George Plank, Upper Lake, Calif.; James Plank, Rogue River, Oregon; Charles N. Plank, North Bend, Oregon; Mrs. Dow Selby, Dunsuir, Calif.; Mrs. Viola Schilker, Lewiston, Idaho; Mrs. Truman Clark, Cottage Grove, Hebron district.

The brother, George Clark, lives at Red Bluff, Calif.; the sisters are Mrs. Sarah Allen, Sacramento, Calif.; Mrs. Walter Hatch, Paradise, Calif.; Mrs. Jane Pinion, Sacramento, Calif. Mr. Plank's wife died in May, 1929, in the Hebron district where her daughter, Mrs. Truman Clark, still lives.

Mr. Plank was born in Phelps county, Mo., April 19, 1857. He was married on July 25, 1875 to Miss Mary Jackson, in Coos county, Oregon, in the town of Dora. Miss Jackson's family and Mr. Plank's family came from Missouri together. Mr. Plank came to Cottage Grove in 1906.

The funeral will be held at Mills chapel at 2 p. m. this Thursday afternoon. Rev. Henry W. Davis of the Baptist church will be in

charge of the services. Interment in Sears cemetery.

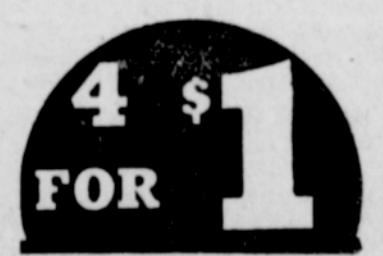
