WALTER F. THOMPSON. Walter F. Thompson, who will be remembered by many of the older residents of Cottage Grove, died at Salem, Ore., February 10. He was the son of Harry and Louisa Thompson, both passed on many years ago. Mr. Thompson was born here September 27, 1878. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Grover Birchett of Salem, and 25 fellow policemen attended and assisted in bearing him to his last resting place, beside his wife, in City View cemetery. He was buried in his police uniform with full honors. He leaves a son, Verden, and one brother, W. A. Thompson, and a sister, Mrs. Hattie Best, of Portland.

The following is from the Capitol Journal, Salem: Walter F. Thompson, who probably had served more years in Salem police service than any other man, ruddy, good-humored and familiar figure on Salem streets, died shortly after 8 o'clock last night at Salem Deaconess hospital. He had undergone surgical treatment February 2 and hope

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held by friends and relatives fled when the nature of the disease was disclosed.

Walter Thompson was known as a man who "could take it." This was manifest in his last illness, both before and after he went to the hospital. Illness attacked him about two months ago, and his stocky, strong body lost nearly 40 pounds in a few weeks. But he didn't complain, or ask for relief. He worked his beat even the day before he was taken to the hospital, although he had scarcely eaten solid food for many days. And after the operation at the hospital friends marveled at the way his rugged constitution clung to life.

Thompson's friendships were extensive, and he was among the best known of Salem jokers. His smile was ready for everyone. He was of ten chosen to appear in amateur theatricals, especially in the days when minstrel skits were popular. He was clever in any comedy role, was naturally musical, and played several instruments although he had not been trained in music. Also he was something of a ventriloquist, and in his younger days adept as a clog dancer. Friends recall that at one time he traveled a short time with a theatrical troupe.

He was born at Cottage Grove, where he attended school and worked in his father's grocery store. After leaving Cottage Grove he went to Medford where he was employed for a time in a hotel. Thompson came to Salem possibly 30 years ago and was employed in a warehouse at Gervais operated by McKinley Mitchell.

After the Gervais fire he came

to Salem and was employed as a street car conductor, and some time later joined the police force when Ira Hamilton was chief. After some years on the force he became a guard at the state penitentiary, was for some time with the Spaulding logging company, and in 1922 again became connected with the Salem police, at the same time that Frank A. Minto and Marion Putnam joined the department.

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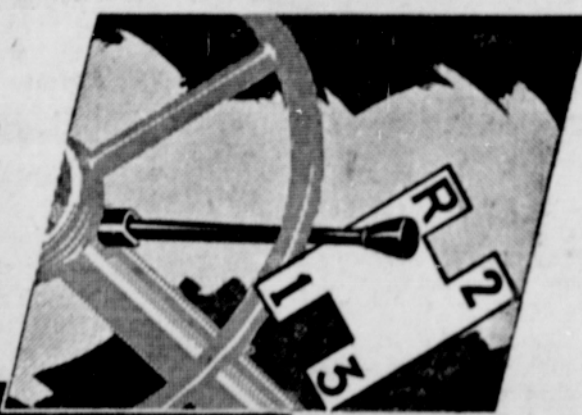
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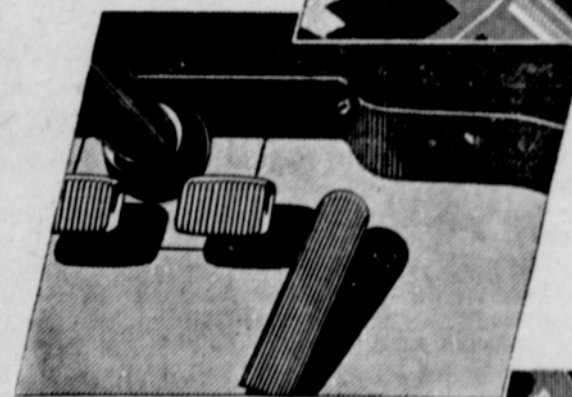
