Panic, Pertaining to Pan

Panic is defined as: "Of or pertaining to Pan." In mythology Pan was the god of shepherds and herds, of groves and fields, and of rural life generally. He was said to be the son of Mercury and Dryope. His favorite residence was in the woods and mountains of Arcadia, where he was frequently heard playing on his pipe or flute of seven reeds, called a syrinx. It was fabled that this pipe was a metamorphosis of a nymph named Syrinx, whom he had loved. His pride in this invention led him into an unlucky contest with Apollo. His festivals were introduced by Evander among the Romans, and by them called Lupercalia. Goats, honey, and milk were the usual offerings to Pan. Pan, like other gods who dwell in forests, was dreaded by travelers, to whom he sometimes appeared, and whom he startled by his uncanny presence. Hence sudden fright, without any visible cause, was ascribed to Pan and was called a panic.
