

Mt. States Power Issues Statement

The Mountain States Power Company's Preferred Stockholders' Protective Committee today released the following statement by the chairman of that committee:

"Mr. David S. Soliday, Chairman of the Preferred Stockholders' Committee, stated today that representatives of the Preferred Stockholders' Committee had completed their investigation and were hopeful that the Mountain States Power Company would be reorganized in such a manner as to be beneficial to the holders of the preferred stock. Mr. Soliday also stated that it had come to the attention of his committee that a decided effort is being made to persuade the present holders of preferred stock that the company is bankrupt and that there is no value to the preferred stock. They are using as one of their arguments that all stockholders should support a public ownership program, representing that upon the acquisition of the assets of the company by such public ownership districts the preferred stockholder would receive greater value from his investment than to continue his holdings. Mr. Soliday stated that he did not believe the preferred stockholders would be deceived by such a plan and pointed out that the support of a public ownership program would be detrimental to their interests and that possibly such a plan is being advocated by some to permit of the acquisition of the company's preferred stock, knowing of its value, to the detriment of the present owners. The company is not bankrupt, nor in liquidation. The earnings of the company have improved, and the company should after reorganization be able to meet its obligations and perform its public utility functions without difficulty."
