FISK GETS APPOINTMENT

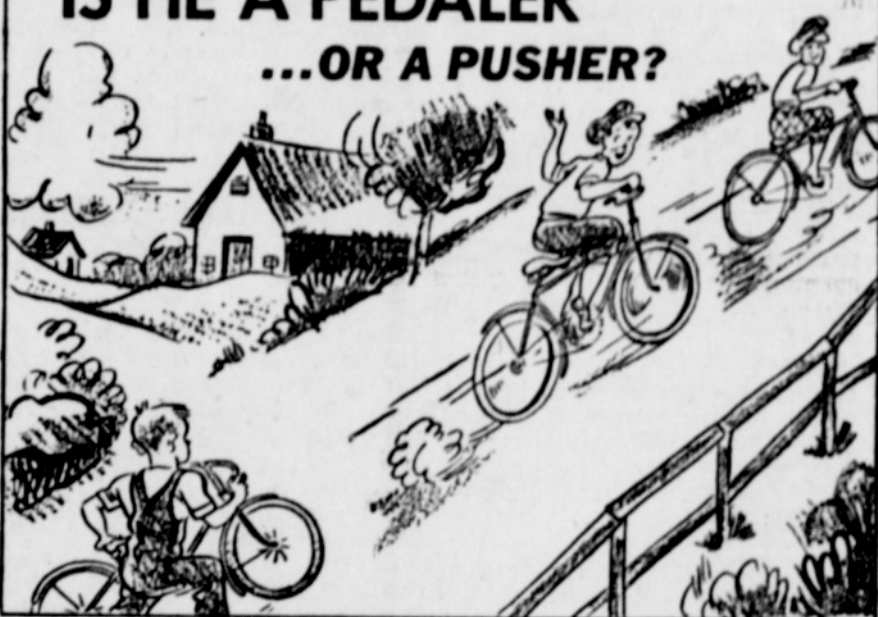
