Wars and Rumors of Wars Around World

March 26 Hitler warned Czechoslovakia that continued alleged suppression of its German minority would not be tolerated by nazi Reich and demanded speedy settlement of the status of Germans living outside Germany.

March 26 Hitler's Field Marshal in Austria, Herman Wilhelm Goering, announced that there would be a political trial to prove Hitler's charge that former chancellor of Austria, Kurt Schuschnigg now in prison, sought to "betray" Austria.

A London Sunday paper has reported that growing disaffection and revolt in Hitler's army have been revealed.

The Anglo-Italian pact is reported deadlocked because England refuses to grant direct recognition of Fascist government in Ethiopia and insists that Mussolini withdraw immediately some of his troops from Spain.

Japan's parliament adjourned Sunday until December, leaving a virtual army dictatorship in control of every resource of the country.

It was reported Sunday that Chinese offensives had thrown back Japanese troops on three fronts, with casualties running into the thousands. Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek's headquarters at Hankow claimed victories in southern Shantung province, northern Honan and on the Shansi front.

The chief concern of France and England is the presence of Italian forces just south of the Franco-Spanish border and in the Balearic Islands of Spain's east coast. The Balearics are strategically located athwart the vital line of French empire communications in the Mediterranean and within easy striking distance of the British empire's "lifeline."

Thousands of marching laborers in Paris demand that French arms and planes be rushed to the rescue of the Spanish loyalists.

Italy determined on final push against Loyalists in Spain has warned France not to aid the Spanish government forces as such a move "might compromise peace on the European continent."

Secretary of State Cordell Hull, on March 4, reiterated that the United States will join a common movement for reduction of armaments but intends to continue its "adequate" national defense program in the face of world unrest and war-like preparations.

President Roosevelt's \$1,113,546,000 naval expansion bill was reported favorably to the house today along with a "policy" amendment which commits the ad-

ministration to ultimate establishment of the greatest fighting armada afloat.

MORE CHECKS FOR FARMERS

R. F. Thom, treasurer of the Lane County Agricultural Conservation association, received on Monday of this week a lot of 177 checks for a total of \$8,424.04 for payment to farmers cooperating in the 1937 agricultural conservation program. The checks are at the association office in the Producers Public Market for delivery

and payees have been notified. To date Mr. Thom has received 631 checks for a total of \$27,238. for cooperators in the 1937 program. O. S. Fletcher, county agent, states that this is about one-third of the total expected for the county.
