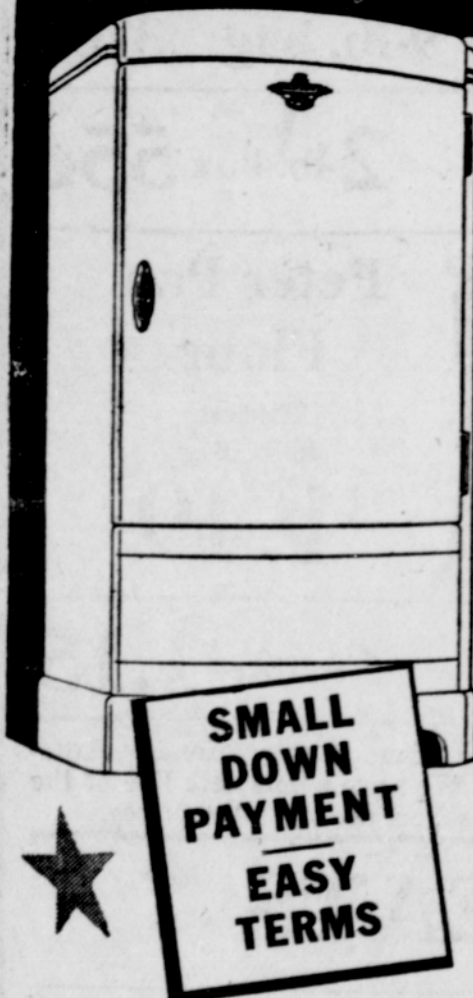

New Oregon Seed Law.

For their own protection, farmers should insist that the seed which they buy for spring planting this year is properly labeled in accordance with the provisions of the new Oregon Seed Law, Frank McKinnon, chief of the state department of agriculture, advises producers. The new law goes into practical effect this year and provides for seed sampling, licensing of seed dealers, examination of seed for purity and freedom from noxious weeds and the determination of the percentage of germination by the Oregon Experiment station seed laboratory and the state department. The law is essentially a labelling law and applies only to agricultural turf and vegetable seeds offered for sale in the state for planting purposes.

In general, the new law requires that seeds be labelled with the name of the seed, place where grown, percentages of pure seed, weed seed, other crop seeds and inert matter, the name and address of the vendor.

OLD FASHIONED CHOCOLATE LAYER CAKE

1 1/2 cup Spry 2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt (cake flour)
1/2 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs, unbeaten 1/4 cup milk

Combine Spry, salt and vanilla. Add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. (So quickly done with smooth, creamier Spry!) Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition.

Sift flour and baking powder together 3 times. Add small amounts of flour to creamed mixture, alternately with milk, beating after each addition until smooth.
