Leroy Noble Castor, formerly of Lorane, died at his home near

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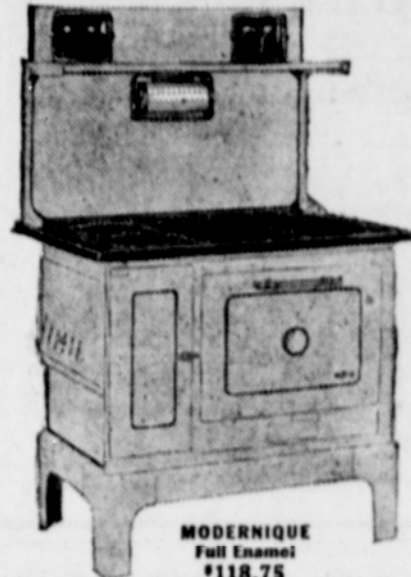
