Rev. James A. Smith attended the meeting of the Presbytery of Willamette Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, held in Brownsville.

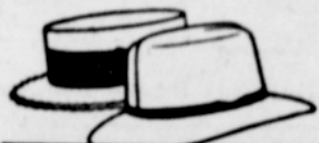
