Heavy Fish Stocking In National Forests

Welcome news to the army of fishermen, which numbers more than ten per cent of the population, is the record of 1937 fish stocking, announced this week for the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington. In Oregon national forests more than 16,800,000 fry and fingerlings were planted by state and other agencies in lakes and streams within forest boundaries. In addition, more than 800,000 fry and fingerlings were planted in Oregon by the U. S. forest service in less accessible waters. The state hatcheries and the U. S. bureau of fisheries were the main sources of supply for stocking.

Cutthroat, rainbow and eastern brook trout were most numerous

of the species planted, though steelhead, sockeye salmon, chinook and silver salmon, Montana black spotted trout, silver trout, and Lock-leven trout also were among the species stocked.

In Oregon the Deschutes national forest took the lead in fish

stocking with 7,700,000. The Siuslaw national forest took second, showing 3,200,000 fingerlings planted, including a number of young chinook salmon.
