CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

It involves the Science of Life, and recognizes only the divine control of Spirit, in which Soul is our master, and material sense and human will have no place" (p. 9).

Incorrect Posture Said Cause of Ills

Men and women past forty, who, with the approach of spring, have to fight against fatigue, should take stock of their posture, says Dr. James E. Slocum, research director of the National Chiropractic association. "Fatigue invariably is associated with faulty body bearing, which can be corrected, thus permitting the human system to operate normally.

"While rest and relaxation are probably called for, the best way to get rid of that tired feeling, is to check on your postural defects and have them corrected.
