Licenses of 196 Auto Operators Revoked

Enforcement machinery in Oregon has taken driving privileges from more traffic violators in the last three months than during any other first quarter in the state's history, Secretary of State Snell said this week.

Intoxicated drivers have been the chief offenders in this period. Licenses of 196 operators have been revoked since January 1 for this offense.

Altogether, license suspensions and revocations during the first three months of this year were nearly half again as numerous as during the first quarter of 1937. Snell believes this indicates stricter enforcement and better cooperation between state departments, rather than more disobedience to law.

Automobile owners should be extremely careful about allowing other persons to borrow their cars, Snell stated. He pointed out that three-fifths of the drivers who lost their licenses subject to the safety responsibility act this year were not the owners of the automobiles they were driving at the time of their arrest.

The U. S.
