Sports Show Proves Highly Entertaining

Many Sportsmen See
Noted Big Game Hunter
Present Moving Pictures.

Some of the finest moving pictures
ever filmed by an amateur
were exhibited Thursday evening
before a large crowd in the Cottage
Grove armory at the Winchester
sports show sponsored by the
Cottage Grove Rod and Gun
club and Graber-Gettys hardware.

The pictures, many in color,
were presented by Claude Parmelee,
expert rifleman and big game
hunter, who had photographed the
"shots" in the heart of the Ontario
wilderness. Parmelee also entertained
with some expert rifle shooting
in the armory, and in the late afternoon
held the interest of a large crowd in an
open air show at the gun club grounds
on south Sixth street. His work
with both small bore and large
calibre rifle was almost uncanny,
and he demonstrated his ability
with the scattergun by some
fancy shots with a 28-gauge.

The show proved so popular
that every effort will be made to
make this an annual event in the
future. As an added attraction,
R. S. Drenner, president of the
local Rod and Gun club, exhibited
a display of wild life paintings.
Drenner's exhibit, as well as being
most attractive artistically, is
technically correct, and aroused
