The C. A. King family of Mt. View were Sunday visitors at the Harry Elfving home.

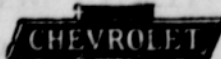
Mr. and Mrs. Warren Kelly attended a Townsend rally and dinner at Culp Creek Sunday.
