The state unemployment compensation commission has decided to send claim and placement deputies to 51 Oregon towns at periods varying from one to four weeks. This is done in order to eliminate collection expenses that have cost claimants as high as 18 per cent of their total benefits. Visits will be made to Cottage Grove twice a week.

Rural Fire Protection Discussed.

Ed Ashley of Silk Creek appeared before the city council Monday evening with a plea for city fire equipment protection for that section. When informed that the city was unable to send its only fire truck outside the city limits without facing a possible damage suit in the event that a fire broke out in the city during the trucks absence. Mr. Ashley expressed interest in organizing a fire protection district for the territory tributary to Cottage Grove when informed that the city would be glad to cooperate in any way possible, both by housing the truck and by furnishing members of the local department to man it, when necessary.

Durable Fir Down For Indefinite Time

The sawmill of the Durable Fir Lumber company at Dorena shut down Monday night for an indefinite time.

Cause of the shut down is reported to be poor market conditions and refusal of the crew to accept a 5c per hour wage reduction. The mill has been paying a minimum wage of 50c per hour, according to W. D. Abel, president of the company, which is 5c higher than many of the Durable Fir mills' competitors. As a result of the shutdown the logging operations of Jones & Williams, contract loggers, are also stopped.

Edward Proctor Long.

Edward Proctor Long was born August 12, 1871, in Kansas. He died April 24 at the Masonic Home, Portland, after a long illness, at the age of 66 years, 8 months and 12 days.

He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. M. H. Callender, and two grandchildren of Astoria; one sister, Mrs. Mamie Reynolds, Walla Walla, Wash.; several nieces and nephews and a host of friends.

Mr. Long came to Oregon with his people when a small boy, living at Milton for several years then moving to Cottage Grove with his people, where he grew to manhood. He accepted a position on the S. P. railroad where he worked for many years. He joined Mt. Hood Lodge No. 157 A. F. & A. M. in 1922. The funeral service was conducted at the Mt. Hood temple in Portland. Interment was in River View cemetery.

Mr. Long has many old friends in this city and many of his relatives are buried here in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery. It will be remembered that his father and older brother put the Long-Landess addition on the Cottage Grove map.

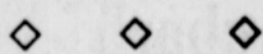
