KEM'S FOR DRUGS REFILLS PRESCRIPTION 35 YEARS OLD

Monday of this week C. J. Kem had cause to stop and reflect over the number of years he has been in the drug business in this city. The number of a prescription, written July 28, 1903, by the late Dr. Job for a Mr. Bales, had been preserved and on Monday of this week was brought in for refill. Mr. Kem dug deep in the files of 100,000 or more prescriptions that have been filled since the drug store was established and produced the original copy. At the time this particular prescription was filled the store was owned by another party, later sold to still another party, of whom Mr. Kem purchased the business 28 years ago. He stated that in that 28 years he had filled approximately 75,000 prescriptions.
