NELSON REPORTS ON AIR MAIL WEEK HERE

Postmaster N. J. Nelson Jr. in a letter to The Sentinel regarding air mail week writes as follows: "The purpose of this letter is to extend thanks to your firm for the splendid cooperation given me during Air Mail Week through the pages of your very fine paper; also to ask your apology for failing to mention your paper when I publicly thanked all who had been at the airport where time was limited and for that reason I overlooked mentioning several who had taken very active part in bringing about a record for Cottage Grove for its first flight and perhaps a record for the entire state. As to number of pieces mailed totaling 1861 letters for the week of which 30 pounds totaling 1277 letters were dispatched on first flight from Cottage Grove May 19, 1938, and in addition 145 air mail letters passed through this office during Air Mail Week.

Of these 93 were ispatched on first flight, 35 of them from Drain, 11 from Curtin, and 47 from Black Butte, Dorena, Lorane, and Culp Creek.

Many trucks were furnished to transport over 600 students to the airport by Cheesman Transfer; C. G. Flour Mill, Vinal T. Randall, Pacific Transport Co. (also on hand due to Mr. Boyd wiring the Southern Pacific Co for special permission to do so). Mr. Seago, a farmer came all the way from London with a large truck to cooperate with the school. A Mr. Griffin from Missouri, with a similar truck cheerfully helped in the task of transportation. Perhaps there are many others who have not been mentioned so I take this opportunity to thank all those who took part in making Air Mail Week in Cottage Grove a grand success. Sincerely yours, N. J.
