WALTER LEROY HATCH

Funeral services will be held at Mills chapel Friday, June 3, at 1:30 p. m. for Walter Leroy Hatch, who passed away Wednesday at the Sacred Heart hospital in Eugene. Rev. James Aiken Smith of the local Presbyterian church will officiate and interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at Oakland, Oregon.

Walter Leroy Hatch was born September 24, 1862 in Ohio. On July 1, 1895 he was united in marriage with Sola L. Berry in North Dakota. To this union were born three children, two of which survive. They are Horace and Bert Hatch of Cottage Grove. Mrs. Hatch died in July, 1917 at Oakland, Oregon. On August 4, 1918 Mr. Hatch married Eva Sanborn at Roseburg. To this union, one child, Dorothy was born. A sister, Mrs. Hattie Seal of Sunfield, Michigan also survives.

Mr. Hatch was a member of the I. O. O. F., Encampment and Rebekah lodges. He had been a resident of Cottage Grove since 1920, coming here from Roseburg. He had been a resident of Oregon since 1910, coming to this state from North Dakota.

WILSON NEWTON HUBBELL

Wilson Newton Hubbell, resident of this city for 30 years, died Sunday at the Veterans' hospital at Roseburg, following an illness of many months. Mr. Hubbell was a retired contractor, being associated with his brother, the late Welcome Hubbell, for several years.

Mr. Hubbell was born May 12, 1871, in Hesper, Ia., and was married July 29, 1913, at Tomah, Wis., to Miss Anna E. Reddelein, who preceded him in death. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World, Odd Fellows, Spanish-American war veterans, and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He served in Porto Rico. He came to Cottage Grove from Sparta, Wis.

Surviving members of the family are one son, Elmer K. Hubbell, Cottage Grove, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Mills chapel. Rev. Ellsworth Tilton of the Methodist church and Rev. I. G. Shaw of Springfield officiated. Spanish-American war veterans were in charge.

Airplane to Carry Passengers From Port Here Sunday

Airminded Cottage Grovians will have an opportunity to see their homes from the air Sunday, when L. J. Sohler of the Sohler Flying Service, Portland, will bring his six passenger Travel Air plane here to fly passengers from the local airport. Flights will also be made to the coast, where the plane will circle over Reedsport and Gardner.

Mr. Sohler gained considerable publicity last year while freighting supplies for the forest service. He transported by plane supplies for 500 men and fifty horses, landing much of the goods with parachutes made of woollacks. Short hops will be made Sunday for \$1 per passenger, while trips to the coast will cost \$5.
