All states have some form of legislation covering production and use of marihuana and these laws can be enforced only through an informed and militant public opinion. What shall we do about it?

The brewers allege that major crimes have decreased, that corruption has been virtually eliminated. Director Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, frankly asserted in a recent address "that serious crimes are increasing, the last three years has been the most terrible period of criminal history in the life of America." It must not be forgotten that these three repeat years which Director Hoover characterizes as "the most terrible period" are the same three years that the consumption of legal beer increased more than 51.5 per cent, from 7.8 gallons to 11.8 gallons per capita, while the consumption of distilled and vinous liquors likewise increased enormously.
