The Trend of Lumber Production, Orders, Shipments Is Down

According to a news release of the West Coast Lumbermen's association June 17, 1938, a total of 151 down and operating mills in Oregon and Washington which reported to the Association for the week ending June 11, 1938, produced 72,803,324 board feet of lumber. At the rate of cutting at the reporting mills, the entire industry produced 46.1 per cent of its average weekly cut during 1926-29.

The new business reported taken last week by the 151 mills was 80,397,484 board feet. Shipments were 85,079,253. Unfilled order file at these mills stood at 238,780,037. Production, orders and shipments, as reported by these mills, show that the entire industry is operating at a level comparable with June 1932. Comparison cannot be made with the previous week due to the Memorial holiday. The trend of production, orders and shipments continues downward.

In a recent survey, the Association found 550 mills "down" out of a total of 950 large and small units in the Douglas Fir area of Washington and Oregon. A total of 285 mills were found to be operating part time and only 115 on full time. The Association estimates that the employment average in June this year of 36,000 persons, logging and sawmilling, compared with approximately 60,000 in June 1937.
