CHILDREN'S FARM HOME

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is holding "Open House" at the Children's Farm Home July 10, celebrating the 15th anniversary of the opening of the first cottage, The Willard. Old friends are invited to visit the home that day and bring if they wish a picnic lunch. Tables will be provided.

At 3 p. m. there will be a program by the children and an address by Senator Homer Angell—long time friend of the Home.

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon founded this home for the care of orphaned neglected or otherwise dependent children, on a farm of 245 acres, increased to 285 later, three miles from Corvallis, on the Albany-Corvallis highway.

The first cottage, "The Willard," began receiving children in July 1923. "The Oregon" was opened in August the same year. There are seven cottages. A modern school building was erected in 1925.

Since the opening of the Willard cottage the home has cared for over 700 boys and girls, ranging in age from three to seventeen. The child population of the home, at present, is 151 in addition to 57 children placed in homes under the supervision of the Board of Trustees. Boys live in five cottages and girls in two.

Educational opportunities are provided through the grade school on Farm property, known as School District No. 42 of Benton County. Six regular teachers and two special WPA instructors are now employed.

The W.C.T.U. County Institute was held yesterday, June 29, in Skinner Butte park, Eugene. The meeting started at 11 a. m. with a covered dish luncheon at noon. The ladies of the Cottage Grove Union were hosts.

Mrs. N. E. Compton, president of the local union, presided. Mrs. Elizabeth Rice led the morning devotions. Mrs. D. R. Winfrey led the noon prayer and Mrs. F.

E. Craft led the afternoon devotions.

The officers gave their routine reports. Mrs. Laura Trachel, of Eugene, reported on the county dry directory. Reports were presented on the Iota Sigma Union; the Children's Farm home and on Alcohol education.

The Children's Farm home will observe its fifteenth anniversary July 10. Visits of those interested will be welcomed that day.

Lepers' Home

United States Marine Hospital No. 68, commonly known as the Lepers' home, is located on what was once the old General Camp Plantation at Carville, Louisiana. The old residence, used as an administration building, was constructed in 1857. The Lepers' home was founded by the state of Louisiana in 1894, and placed under the charge of the order, "Sisters of Saint Vincent de Paul." In 1921, it was turned over to the federal government and is the only hospital in the United States treating leprosy. The staff consists of doctors, dentist, priest, Protestant minister and nurses.
