

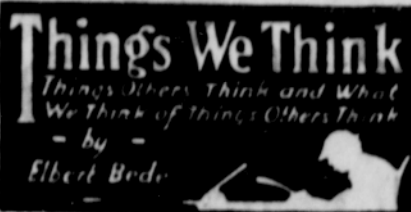

Hawley Discusses Water System at C. of C. Meeting

Auxiliary Well May Be Sunk to Provide Emergency Service; Restricted Irrigation Now.

C. J. Kem, Roy Short and J. H. Chambers were appointed as a committee from the chamber of commerce to cooperate with the city council in working out plans to secure a more adequate water supply for the city. The chamber, after hearing a talk on the city's water system by Councilman Ralph Hawley at their regular meeting Tuesday, went on record in favor of the sinking of a test hole in the Thornton Corners area, to see whether a safe auxiliary pumping system might be established there, to provide the city with ample water for irrigation and fire protection in the event of trouble on the main intake from the Rutledge area. Members of the water committee of the city council, Jesse Lansing Sr., A. W. Helliwell and A. W. Shofstall, had already launched plans for such a test.

Much of the Tuesday noon session of the chamber was devoted to the discussion of the city's water system. Councilman Hawley stated that the cities indebtedness of \$112,000 on its water system was too great to enable the revenue from the system to pay interest and maintenance expense on the present gravity system installed 28 years ago. He expressed himself as strongly in favor of a temporary auxiliary pumping system, with the eventual replacement of the present gravity system by a pumping system, to do away with the 25 miles of pipe line, which in Mr. Hawley's opinion, has seen its best days, and will have to be replaced within the next few years. He censured other members of the council for failing to take action on a committee's report made a year ago, in which the auxiliary pumping system was discussed.

Roy Short, L. J. McCoy, C. J. Kem and J. H. Chambers all spoke briefly on the problem, and few agreed upon just what should be done, and which type of water system would furnish the cheapest and most adequate supply system for the city.

Meanwhile the city reservoir again has a normal supply of water on hand, according to City Engineer L. W. Coiner, and the water committee Monday announced that irrigation would be permitted for two hours daily, between 7 and 9 p. m., as long as a safe reserve can be maintained in the city reservoir. They urged patrons of the water system to use only the amount of water actually needed, and to avoid waste.

Ambulance Makes Fast Trip to Roseburg

The Mills ambulance made a flying trip to Roseburg Tuesday evening, in response to an emergency call from Drain, where a woman was suffering from strychnine poisoning. Sixty-three minutes after receiving the call, the ambulance was in Roseburg, with the patient in the hospital. A stop of several minutes was made in Drain. L. J. McCoy and Claude Miller were at the wheel. The patient is given a fair chance for recovery.

Bohemia Mill to Start Work Monday

Lumber mills in the Cottage Grove area were preparing to resume operations with the modification of the order closing operations due to the fire hazard. Logging operations are now permitted between the hours of midnight and 1 p. m. and the woods crews at most of the mills were back on the job early Wednesday morning.

The Bohemia Lumber company at Culp Creek, down for several weeks, plans to resume operations at their mill Monday. Woods crews went to work there Wednesday. The Durable Fir mill at Dorena has resumed operations, and the woods crew at J. H. Chambers & Son and the W. A. Woodward Lumber company are back to work.

It is reported that some of the mills around Lorane resumed operations as soon as the logging ban was modified.

PWA Allotment Totaled \$1,239,940

Building projects having a total estimated cost of more than \$25,000,000, will be constructed in the northwest and Alaska with the aid of allotments already approved by the Public Works Administration under its new recovery program. A total of 122 allotments, amounting to \$12,025,398, including loans and grants, have been authorized for public works in this region since the new PWA program was launched. The region comprises Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska.

Washington leads, with 74 grants totaling \$9,207,709. Oregon has received 20 grants and loans, totaling \$1,239,940. The grants represent 45 per cent of the estimated total cost of construction. The remaining 55 per cent is supplied by the applicant. Work on many of these projects is expected to start in the next few weeks.

Director Hockley urged public bodies throughout the region to lose no time in submitting their needs, as September 30 is the deadline for filing applications. The Scout Mothers should be able to get 45 per cent of the cost of the two new tennis courts they propose to construct.

Free Methodist to Change Pastors Here

Rev. George G. Navy Academy Vacancy

Congressman James W. Mott has announced that the First Congressional District of Oregon will have a vacancy in 1939 at both the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point.

To determine the eligible candidates residing in his district, Congressman Mott has requested the Civil Service Commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 8, 1938.

Any young unmarried man, not less than 16 years of age nor more than 20 years of age on April 1, 1939, may take the qualifying examination for the Annapolis appointment.

Candidates for the West Point appointment must be not under 17 nor over 22 years of age on July 1, 1939, and not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that the applicant notify Congressman James W. Mott, 328 Oregon building, Salem, Ore., not later than September 1, 1938, of his desire to participate in the examination.

27 Set as Date For 4th Lane Fair

Community May Be Held on Same Date Making Year's Biggest Event Here.

At the request of County Club Leader Dick Kuehner, H. E. Eakin, chamber of commerce president, Tuesday designated Saturday, August 27 as the date for the Southern Lane County Fair, annual Cottage Grove event, where 4-H club boys and girls display the results of their progress during the past year. Joe Smith has been appointed chairman of the chamber of commerce committee on the fair and will name his own assistants.

Last week the date of the first annual Cottage Grove Get-together picnic and barbeque was tentatively announced for August 20. It now appears likely, though no official announcement has been made, that this picnic will also be held on August 27, making that date a banner one for Cottage Grove.

The picnic was discussed informally Friday evening at the merchants dinner held at the Hotel Coffee Shop. Opinion there was divided upon the best date for this affair. Some merchants felt that Saturday was a poor date, because it was difficult to close business places for even a short time on Saturdays without inconveniencing shoppers, and the merchants wished to gather with their visitors, not only for the big dinner, but also for an afternoon of sociability and entertainment.
