**Most Unusual Bloom Draws Flower Lovers To Nicholson Home**

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Nicholson, at 412 Adams avenue, was the Mecca of all the flower lovers of Cottage Grove Tuesday night and Wednesday morning.

The attraction was a Night Blooming Cereus—a member of the Cactus family—and one of the most beautiful and fascinating of the more than one hundred species of Cereus, although not all are nightblooming.

There is something almost uncanny about a plant that opens its blossoms for a few hours at long intervals and then in the darkest hours of the night.

In the afternoon Tuesday one of the long large buds on the Nicholson plant suddenly showed signs of life and as darkness came on the bud began to unfold and gradually, as the pronounced trembling in the loosened sepals and petals as nature caused them to expand, the glamorous queen of the night slowly emerged to show herself to her flower loving subjects.

This writer has seen a species of the cereus in the Philippine Islands where it is sometimes called "Dama de Noche" and "Reina de Noche".

There is also a hedge of a species of cereus in Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands, where thousands of blooms come out in a single night. The Nicholson plant originally came from Costa Rica. Their daughter, Mrs. T. R. Taylor presented it to them.

According to an article in "Better Homes and Gardens" there was a legend among the ancient Aztecs that they would discover a land of plenty when they found an eagle, a snake and a cactus. In 1312 having found what they were seeking, high in the mountains they laid the foundations of Mexico City. Today the coat of arms of Mexico bears an eagle and a serpent in its beak, resting on an Indian fig cactus.
