THE CHURCHES

The Free Methodist Pastor.

The Rev. Louis A. Skusie who arrived Thursday from Falls City to take over the pastoral duties at the Free Methodist church is a native of Michigan, but has spent the most of his life in Oregon.

He received his education in the church schools in Seattle, Wash., and Grinnville, Ill., and shortly thereafter entered the ministry.

He was converted at St. Helens, Ore., and became a charter member of that society, which is still in existence and going strong. After a lapse of 20 years he returned to be a pastor of the church in which he was a charter member. Under his ministry the church was remodeled, enlarged and began its period of expansion.

The Rev. Skusie has served in the capacity of a pastor for twenty-four years, and has spent the most of his time in and around Portland. Three years ago he was transferred to Falls City from where he has transferred to the Cottage Grove church.

Two boys grace the home, L. A. Jr., 21, and Edgar, 17, who will be in his senior year of the high school.

Mrs. Skusie is active in church and community work. She served for two years as president of the Polk County Holiness association, president of the local W. C. T. U. and president of the Missionary Society.

The Rev. Mr. Skusie will occupy the pulpit Sunday at the local church both morning and evening. The subject for the morning will be "The God That Lived in Daniel's Time." In the evening he will speak on, "Beyond the Border."
