### Head of Norwegian Parliament Relative of Of Cottage Grove Man

Georg Bjorset motored to Eugene Monday evening where he attended the banquet in honor of C. J. Hambro, president of the Norwegian parliament. Mr. Hambro's wife is a cousin of Mr. Bjorset, and Mr. Bjorset's sister is Mr. Hambro's secretary.

Mr. Hambro is making a tour of the United States under the auspices of the Sons of Norway. He spoke at Villard hall at the University of Oregon following the chamber of commerce sponsored dinner at the Osborne hotel. A reception at the home of Mr. Larson, president of the Eugene chapter of the Sons of Norway followed, after which Mr. Hambro made a brief visit at the Bjorset home in Cottage Grove before leaving for San Francisco where he was scheduled to speak Tuesday evening.

Mr. Hambro enjoys a unique position in Norwegian politics, being the choice of both conservative and labor parties. He is also the representative of his country at the League of Nations and upon completion of his tour of the United States will leave directly for Geneva. Mr. Bjorset and Mr. Hambro had not met for twenty years, when the latter was a guest at the Bjorset home in Norway.

The speakers' talk at the University of Oregon proved unusually interesting, it is reported. He discussed the remarkable progress achieved in Norway during the past twenty years, particularly in the electrical field. Practically every farm home in Norway is electrified completely, even being heated by that method. This has been accomplished by the harnessing of a portion of the vast water power available in the mountains, and this in turn was accomplished by freighting all the supplies for dams and equipment into the mountains by airplane during the winter months. Norway has more telephones per capita than any other European nation, and these phones are all automatic. It is possible to dial a number from any phone in Norway, and obtain either the weather report for the next 48 hours, the exact time, or arrange for a call at any hour desired the following morning. This is all accomplished automatically.
