Ben Layng spent the week end with a cousin in Portland.

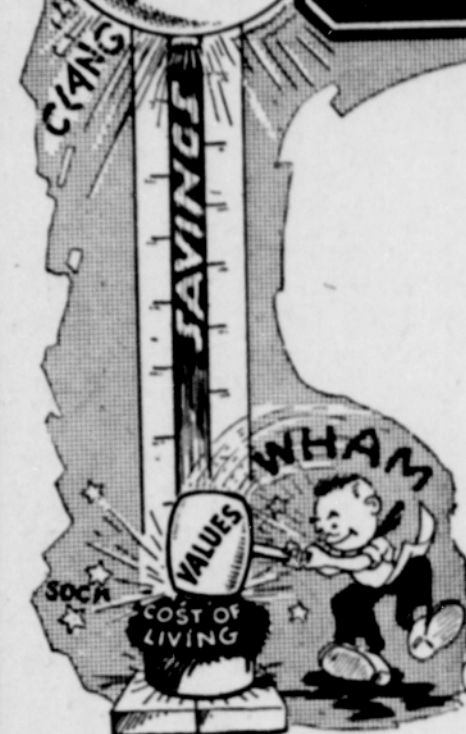
Peace at Any Price.

While in the state he purchased 19 gallons of gasoline on which he paid the state tax of five cents a gallon, or a total of 95 cents. The Latvian official promptly filed a claim for refund with Secretary of State Hull who just as promptly forwarded the claim on to Oregon's secretary of state, Earl Snell.
