Union High School Proposal

(Continued from page 1.)

The following communication has been received with the request the same be given publicity for the information of the public:

Signers Answer

To Editor of Cottage Grove Sentinel:

In a recent communication to the Sentinel the sixteen signers of the remonstrance against the formation of a union high school district for this section of Lane County presented data to prove their contention. The following misleading conclusions and inferences were made from the figures presented:

1. The millage levies given for the 13 non-high school districts are for grade school work only, while the millage levy for the Cottage Grove district included both grades and high school, of the total 23.3 mills about 12½ mills for high school costs. The proposed district is for high school purposes only, and will have no effect upon the grade schools now maintained by these districts. Hence the millage data presented

Furthermore the city district will be assisting the other districts by paying proportionate share of the cost of transportation for rural pupils, without receiving benefit of transportation for the Cottage Grove pupils.

3. The letter states that "Cottage Grove received \$76.02 per pupil from outside districts which amount is based on the actual cost to the district." This is a misstatement since the law does not permit a high school district to include all items of expense in figuring costs, such as payment of bonds, interest on bonds and several capital outlays. The clerk of district No. 45 in his annual report shows that the actual per pupil cost was \$80.00 instead of the \$76.02 collected.

Dr. C. L. Huffaker, educational expert of the University of Oregon, in his survey on the high school situation points out that a town district maintaining a high school cannot collect from non-high school districts, under present Oregon law, the full amount of per pupil costs.

4. The communication has failed to mention what the non-high school districts are now paying for high school tuition. The past year each non-high school district in Lane County paid five mills for this purpose. Those districts which have operated busses have had the additional expense of paying transportation costs. The London district, as estimated by the clerk of that district, has been paying approximately three mills for high school transportation, making a total high school cost of eight mills. It is predicted by the County Non-High School Board that the non-high school levy will continue to increase as in the past (1½ mills increase in three years) due to the formation of consolidations, and the increase in high school attendance. The levy is expected to approach six mills for next year. The estimated cost of operating the union high school district, including building and interest charges, is 12½ mills, or a yearly tax of \$1.21 for every \$100 of assessed valuation. In a number of Oregon counties now the non-high school levy exceeds this millage, for example in Clackamas County the non-high school levy is 14.4 mills, in Deschutes County, 12½ mills, and Malheur County 12½ mills.

We the undersigned favor a union high school for the following reasons:

1. Because of an over-crowded situation in the present high school building, and the financial inability of the Cottage Grove district to remedy the situation.

2. Because the present facilities cannot provide complete instruction.

has no bearing whatsoever upon the issue.

2. The statement is made that the 13 rural districts "will pay more than three times as much per pupil," based upon assessed valuation facts. This is entirely misleading. The tax within the union high school district will be uniform, i.e., the millage levy will be the same for every property owner throughout the entire union district. The amount of tax will depend upon the budget of expenses divided into the entire assessed valuation of the union high school district, approximately four million dollars. No school tax is actually based upon the number of pupils in relation to the assessed valuation as inferred by the statistics given.

Also the number of pupils from districts outside Cottage Grove has been increasing to such an extent the past four years that indications are the number from the outside will soon equal those from Cottage Grove. Actual figures are as follows:

6. Because it will provide the best possible educational advantages for the youth of this section.

Gentlemen:

As a member of the non-high school board since the law was put in operation, I have been directly interested in all the high schools of the county, especially from the viewpoint of expense and the efficiency of each.

The cost to the non high school district has increased steadily, beginning with 3.9 mills in 1934 to 5 mills in 1937, and we have every reason to believe it will continue to increase because of the valuation becoming smaller each year.

In making a comparison of the amount of levy in Lane County with the counties of the Willamette Valley, we find our non-high school district levy to be one of the lowest, many of them levy about 15 mills.

I feel that a union high school for the Cottage Grove area to be a wise move, as it will provide transportation for all living within the union high school district, and in this way give all the high school pupils either near or far from the high school building an equal opportunity.

NYA Funds Are Increased \$19,000

Students of collegiate grade who are in doubt as to how they will pay their tuitions and buy books this fall will be heartened by the announcement made this week by Ivan G. Munro, Oregon director of the National Youth Administration, in which he stated that funds available for Student Aid projects in Oregon colleges have been increased \$19,000 this year for a total of \$134,000. In Oregon there are 23 schools in this group which will receive proportional allotments based on their past enrollment.

These student aid funds are available for needy college and graduate students in regular attendance in institutions of collegiate standing for part-time work during the academic year. Individual earnings are limited to an average of \$15 per month for students of collegiate standing and \$30.00 for graduates. Rates of pay at the individual institutions are determined by the college or university authorities. No provisions are made for direct loans or scholarships.

Such student aid employment is provided only for students of good character who need the assistance to enter or to remain in school. Applicants are limited to persons between the ages of sixteen through twenty-four years, carrying at least three-quarters of a normal full-time program. Graduate applicants must have completed satisfactorily the requirements for a Bachelor's degree.

Representatives of Local Industry Ask Consideration of Union High School Proposal.

Representatives of industry ask to be heard in the following petition which has been presented to us for publication:

We the undersigned, who represent various industries located outside of Cottage Grove and within the proposed Union High School District appeal to the fair minded voters within Cottage Grove and the various outlying districts to give careful consideration before voting for the proposed Union High School District which proposes a \$264,000.00 plant; the cost of which will be borne approximately 69% by the outlying districts and 31% by District No. 45 (Cottage Grove.)

With the average daily attendance for the school year 1937-38 from Cottage Grove 225 students and the average daily attendance of outlying districts 155, this would make the cost per student to the outside districts over three times as much as to Cottage Grove, (District No. 45).

We believe in all of our students having all the educational advantages possible but inasmuch as the present high school built at a cost of \$38,000.00 has been able to accommodate all the students up to the present time, it seems to us that an investment not exceeding \$25,000.00 would build an addition or an annex to the present building which would take care of the increased attendance for many years to come.

Farmers and industry are struggling under adverse market conditions, high taxes and high wage scales and are having a hard enough time without adding an additional levy for something that we consider an extravagant and unwarranted expenditure at this time.
