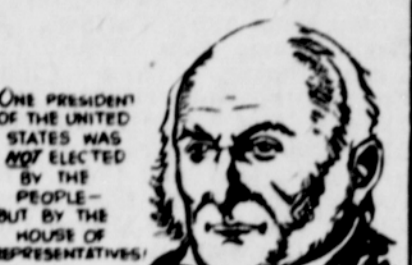
Mrs. F. M. Chapman entertained Saturday evening with a card party. Two tables of bridge were played. Eighteen were present. Refreshments were served.

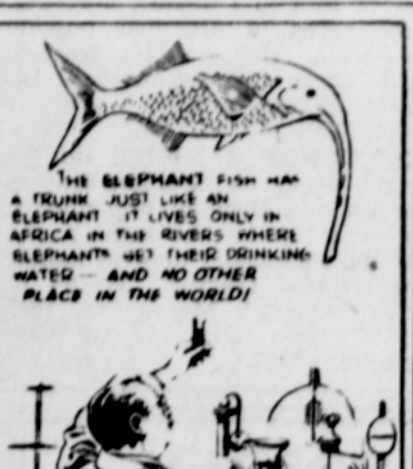

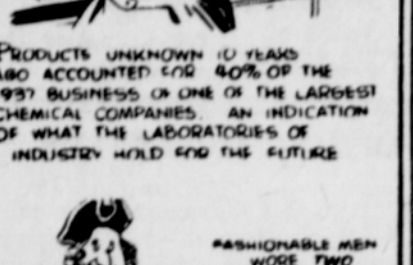

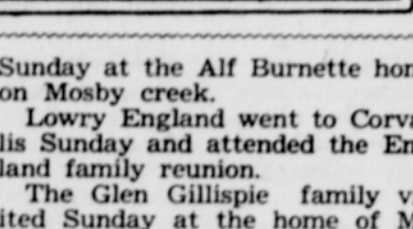

New Ideas Given Nut Growers on an Inspection Tour

A new spray material for walnut blight, promising leads for the control of filbert blight and filbert worms, and some new developments in orchard cultivation and fertilization are but a few of the features brought out on this year's annual field tour of the Western Nut growers association. The first day of the tour was spent at the Oregon Experiment station at Corvallis and the second in Washington and Yamhill counties north and west of Newberg.

Dr. P. W. Miller, federal plant pathologist stationed at OSC, reported that tests with copper oxalate over the past three years have given consistently good results in the control of walnut blight, equal or better than bordeaux mixture and without the foliage injury that sometimes accompanies use of bordeaux.

The copper oxalate comes in a powder form and is mixed directly with water for spraying. It is more expensive at present but it is hoped that by pooling orders growers may get a shipment from the east at a more reasonable price. Dr. Miller will assist in assembling such an order if he is notified of growers' needs.

In the Brown and McClure orchard at Scholls the growers saw comparative results with using ordinary and neutral bordeaux mixture. Where lime was reduced to 4-1-50, practically no foliage damage occurred and control was just as good. W. G. Brown, who has sprayed consistently for blight since 1932, said it is one of his most profitable operations, even this year when blight is not as serious as usual in unsprayed orchards. Last year he figured a return of \$9 for every one spent in spraying.

Early fall spraying before fall rains is showing promise in filbert blight control. Bordeaux 4-2-50 is being used on experimental plots. The critical period is about the same as with peach blight. One spray with calcium arsenate for filbert work is showing promise, thought definite results are not available, B. G. Thompson, entomologist, reported.

C. E. Schuster, federal nut specialist, and R. E. Stephenson, soils scientist, reported on some long-time fertility and moisture research, emphasizing that more time will be needed before definite recommendations can be made.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS LESS.

Registering decreases in traffic accidents and injuries throughout the state, plus a sizeable drop in fatalities, Oregon counties continued to improve their records during July and brought about stiffer competition for leading roles in the war against accidents, Secretary of State Earl Snell announced this week.

The decrease in accidents amounted to 24 per cent, the drop in injuries to 20 per cent, and in fatalities, 12 per cent, Snell said.

Lane county took fifth place among the state's seven Group II counties on the basis of improvement over the first seven months of 1937 in traffic accidents, injuries and fatalities. Last month this county ranked third in this group.

EXAMINERS FOR MOTOR LICENSES HERE AUG. 29.
