

Grove Lions Chalk Up Second Victory

Cottage Grove chalked up their second straight victory of the season with a 19-0 victory over the Eugene B squad here Friday. Although the Grove team held a little weight advantage they pushed over only one touchdown on running plays. The "little" Axemen fought every minute of the game.

The Grove's first touchdown came in the second quarter on a pass from Patten to Booher. The extra point was not good. The next touchdown came when Blake knocked a Eugene pass into Spies hands. Spies raced 70 yards over the goal line for the score. Lusk made the extra point. Patten made the third score on a line plunge from the five.

During the whole game the Lions were never really in danger, again showing their defensive strength. Twice a fleetfooted Axeman broke away for long gains but these were their only threats.

Of the Grove team Newton seemed to be the ground-gaining star, while Lusk and Booher showed well.

Pilot To Be Here Sun. Flew 20,000 Miles During Siskiyou Fire

L. J. Sohler of the Sohler Flying Service, Portland, who flew passengers from the Cottage Grove airport last June on both local scenic flights, and trips to the coast, will bring his big Travelair cabin plane here to fly passengers again next Sunday.

Mr. Sohler might have flown around the world this summer, but he didn't. Instead, he made, or rather hauled hay while the sun shined, and sometimes when it didn't or couldn't be seen for smoke, for he put in most of the summer hauling supplies for the forest service. He not only hauled hay, straw and other feed for the livestock engaged in combating some of the northwest's worst fires, but also axes, shovels, beds, tents, radios and even a gasoline "pumper" and fire hose.

"I hauled supplies one day on the Smith river fire," Mr. Sohler told an old acquaintance at The Sentinel office, and then was called to the Siskiyou's, where I was kept busy for 32 straight days, during which time I flew more than 20,000 miles, and hauled more than 150,000 pounds of supplies. It was mighty tough flying, and long days, and I finally made up my mind that if I could hold out for one more day I was going home for Christmas. (Mr. Sohler and the Sentinel reporter are natives of the same community in Minnesota.) Well, I made that extra day, and I am sure planning on going home this December.

"The smoke was so bad that we had to fly at 8,000 feet, and the only way we could tell where to drop supplies was by the reflection from a mirror on the ground. We flew to the mirror by compass."

The local airport has been much improved this summer, Mr. Sohler reports, and will be in use more in the future, due to a change in regulations at Washington, which will be good news to the numerous Cottage Grove residents who dug deep in their pockets to help finance the field, only to find that it was very much "Uncle Sam's" instead of the city's. "The government plans to have airport's like the one at Cottage Grove, used as much as practical in the future," Mr. Sohler said.

SCOUT MOTHERS PLAN CONCERTED DRIVE FOR FUNDS

A concerted drive to raise the final funds necessary for starting construction of a cement tennis court for the city was launched by the Scout Mothers club at their meeting Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Georg Bjorset. It is planned to contact every civic, social and fraternal organization, both men's and women's, in the campaign for funds.

The Scout Mothers club has raised \$140 through various projects such as teas, bingo games and card parties and only \$135 remains to be raised before construction can be started.

The executive committee of the club pointed out that if each organization in the city would contribute even a small amount the building fund would be materially increased. The Scout Mothers club raised a large percentage of the \$140 through bingo games held on Main street. This source of income has been stopped by inclement weather. The club plans to resume this activity in the spring when weather permits.

The \$275 which the scout group hopes to raise is the amount necessary for material for construction. Labor costs will be taken care of through WPA.

All members of the Scout Mothers' club will take part in contacting the various organizations in the city and the club hopes to receive hearty cooperation in its efforts to provide a tennis court for the city.

During the meeting Mrs. James Bird gave a report of the local girl scout summer camp held during August at Rujada.

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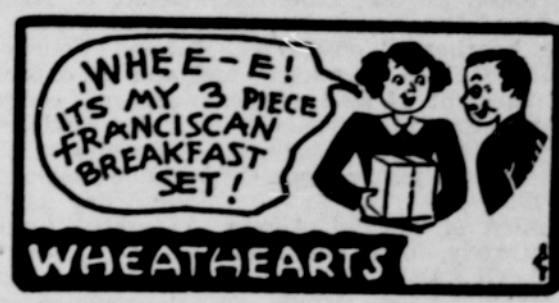
