

North Bend Bulldogs Give Lions First Defeat of Season

The Cottage Grove Lions met with their first defeat in three starts at the hands of North Bend on the Bulldogs' home field Saturday to the tune of 19 to 6.

The Bulldogs enjoyed a good weight advantage. This combined with the speedy running of Marion Susick, Bulldog fullback, gave the North Bend team the victory. Cottage Grove took the ball on the opening kick-off and pushed into North Bend territory only to lose the ball on downs.

After exchanging the ball several times North Bend scored when Susick went off-tackle and ran 30 yards for a touchdown. The try for point failed.

The Lions took the ball and worked it deep into North Bend territory on a series of passes. A pass, Patton to Davenport, was good for the score. The try for point failed.

Twice more Susick scored. Once from the 55-yard line and once from the 25-yard line. One try for point was good.

Davenport and Patton in the backfield and Spies and McKibben in the line were the outstanding players on the Lions' first string, while Earl, Lusk and Zimmerly took honors for the subs.

The most outstanding tackle of the game was made when McKibben tackled Susick after a long run.

Work Progresses on Channel Deepening

A WPA crew of 12 men have been making steady progress in deepening the channel of the Coast Fork through Cottage Grove, by removing a ledge of bedrock that has been a factor in slowing down the current through the city.

A channel from 25 to 30 feet wide is being blasted from almost solid rock for a distance of 200 feet on the west bank of the river, a short distance north of the Main street bridge. This project is part of Cottage Grove's flood control plan.

Blasting has been underway for a week and the rocks, after being broken loose, are removed from the river with a "donkey." They will be used for a retaining wall later. To avoid danger from falling rocks, the blasting is done under a "mat" of logs. With the exception of the donkey which has been rented from the county, most of the equipment used, including a compressor and jack hammer have been leased from the Mt. States construction company in Eugene. Tom Nelson is in charge of the blasting.

In order to speed up the work as much as possible, before the rainy season starts, the crew will be divided into two units, in order that work will not be halted when the workmen have put in their allotted number of hours per month. City Engineer L. W. Coiner stated Wednesday.

While it is not expected that the deepening of the channel at this point will prevent major floods, when conditions are right for them, it is believed that the deepening of the channel will aid in preventing minor floods, when the river channel in its old condition was able to carry all but a small portion of the water.
