

Outlook Shows Farm Animals on Increase

A considerable increase in United States hog production is in prospect under the influence of abundant supplies of relatively low cost feeds, according to the annual livestock outlook report just issued by the OSC extension service. The pig crop of 1938 will total about 12 per cent greater than the comparatively small crop of 1937. As a result, the supply of pork will be larger during the 1938-39 marketing season and beyond.

This increase in supply will be offset to some degree by stronger consumer demand and purchasing power, if economic conditions continue to improve, the report adds.

Regarding the sheep and lamb situation, the outlook report shows that the 1938 lamb crop was the largest on record in the United States, being 5 per cent greater than in 1937. Although the number of breeding ewes next January may be slightly larger than last, this does not necessarily mean a larger lamb crop in 1939, the report continues. The record lamb crop this year was caused largely by an unusually high percentage of lambs saved.

The wool situation is somewhat firmer than earlier in the year, with prospects that stocks of raw wool in this country may be no larger at the end of the year than at the close of 1937. Wool price trends are geared to world conditions, but there are no particularly significant trends in wool production in the world as a whole at the present time.

The outlook report deals also with the dairy, poultry and beef cattle situation, and with considerable basic data and graphic presentation of general farm price levels in the United States and Oregon.

A comparison of the income of industrial workers in the United States and the level of prices in Oregon for animal products shows a striking parallel. For example, in the boom year of 1929, with industrial workers earnings at 107 per cent of the 1926-1930 average, the Oregon animal products price index was 110. For 1938 the preliminary index of industrial workers income was 68, and the animal products price index was 66.

Voters Registration Hits All-Time High

More Lane county voters will be eligible to cast their ballots in the November election than at any previous time in the county's history, according to figures released this week by County Clerk Walter B. Dillard, Monday.

The total number on the register Monday was 35,612 of which 18,606 were in the republican column and 15,916 in the democratic. Under the head of miscellaneous there were 1090.

This is a higher number than the previous high record in 1932 when an effort was made to move the University of Oregon to Corvallis and Lane county voters flocked to the polls to defeat the measure. The totals at that time are not available but it was something over \$33,000, Clerk Dillard recalls.

For comparison, registration in the county for the November election in 1936 and in 1934 are given. They are as follows:

1936—Republicans, 17,906; democrats, 13,805; miscellaneous, 1,284; total, 32,995.

1934—Republicans, 17,961; democrats, 10,968; miscellaneous, 2,111; total, 30,280.

FEDERATION AGAINST CHAIN TAX.

Great interest in shown in Oregon over the drive against the chain store tax at the Houston, Texas, national labor meeting.

The American Federation of Labor in its 58th annual convention went on record in Houston on October 14th as unanimously opposed to the discriminatory taxation of chain stores. Holding that chain store taxes are "punitive, discriminatory and confiscatory in intent," and that they seriously affect employment and the cost of living, the American Federation of Labor Convention by unanimous vote adopted the report of its legislative committee and instructed the executive council to take all necessary action to fight such taxes.

The subject specifically before the convention was the proposed Patman Bill in Congress which would tax chain stores as high as \$49,000 a year per store.

He was 77 years of age. He had been a resident of Cottage Grove for forty years, and a merchant here for thirty years, until his retirement several years ago. Rev. James A. Smith was in charge of the funeral services. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

LOGGING FOR CONTINUOUS PRODUCTION

"Logging for Continuous Production" was announced today as the keynote of the Pacific Logging Congress, meeting at Tacoma, October 19-20-21, by Congress President Walter J. Ryan, of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

"Since 1900 an advance guard has been exploring the practical possibilities of what is generally called 'timber cropping,' or 'sustained yield,' or 'selective logging,'" Ryan said. "Actual experience and research in the field, carried on under the compulsion of sustaining payrolls and meeting costs, have at last brought the industry to a point from which logging for continuous production can be calculated on a basis of proven facts. These facts will be stated and discussed at the Tacoma meeting. Preceding the hearings of the joint congressional committee on forestry, which will report its findings on the same questions next April, the Tacoma meeting is of great significance to the Pacific Northwest."

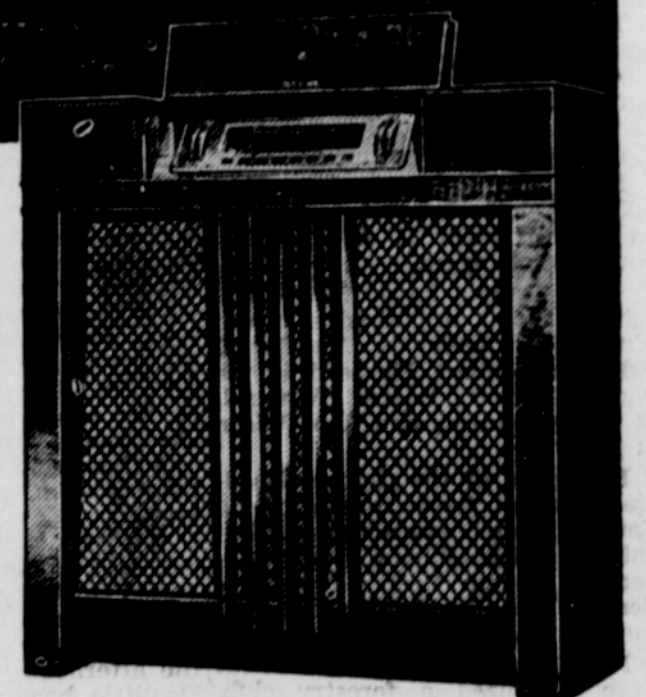
